## Red Sox Lose To Chicago As Yankees Win

(By The Canadian Press) After losing eight in a row to Boston Red Sox at Fenway Park, the Chicago White Sox came from behind yesterday to beat the American League pace setters 4-3 in 11 innings for their first Boston victory of the season.

Pitcher Mace Brown, who relieved Tex Hughson in the ninth, was credited with the loss and 41-year-old Earl Caldwell, who pitched the last three innings in his 32nd relief role this season, got credit for his 11th victory of the year.

Hughson held the Chicks to eight hits and no runs in eight and two-thirds innings but blew up in the ninth when the White Sox tied the score at 3-all fashioning three runs on singles of Frank Hayes and Oob Kennedy, a double by Michael and a single by pinch-hitter Ed Lopat.

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
