

Ch'Town Curlers Win Over Montague

Eastern Rinks Challenge For McArthur Trophy Turned Back By 38-25 Score

The McArthur trophy is still in possession of Charlottetown Club curlers today as three rinks last night turned back a challenge from a like number of Montague rinks to win the opening inter-club trophy 'spiel' of the season by a 38-25 score.

Trailing 13 to 15 at the completion of the first half of the fourteen end matches the winners went into the lead at the end of the eighth end of play and were never headed afterwards. But Montague although losing thirteen points were right in the thick of the fight right up to the final ends. Here Charlottetown staged their garrison finish to outscore their opponents 16 to 3 in the final three ends and account for their skip by Randolph.

The rinks accounted for the big margin in Charlottetown's victory as they won 14 to 6 but it was only in the last ends again that Charlottetown pulled their rinks through. The rinks came through with a four end on the twelfth, added a single on the thirteenth and won his match with a big three to the score board on the fourteenth.

The George McIntyre-Dr. W. Tidmarsh match was another see-saw battle with Tidmarsh coming out on top 10 to 9. Tied at 6-6 entering the twelfth Dr. Tidmarsh's rinks chalked up a three and added one on the thirteenth but McIntyre fighting with his back to the wall came through with a victory on the final end as he scored a three to just miss a tie game.

Closest match of the night was between Dr. H. McIntyre and R. Carruthers for the whole fourteen ends it was anybody's battle, Beck took a 3-0 lead on the first three;

Black Hawks Gain 4-2 Victory Over Brooklyn

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (AP)—Chicago Black Hawks scored a 4-2 victory over Brooklyn Americans tonight before 7,341 customers in the Chicago Stadium. The defeat dropped the Americans into sixth place in the National Hockey League standings. Brooklyn trading places with Detroit Red Wings who beat Boston tonight.

The Hawks, who gained two points on the idle Toronto Maple Leafs, scored one goal in the first period for a 1-0 edge, two in the second for a 3-1 margin and one more in the third, the Americans getting their second marker in the final stanza.

Cully Dahlstrom shoved the Chicagoans off in front at 12:06 of the opening period when Bill Thoms and Alex Kozlov set up the tally with smart passing.

On a long dash the veteran Earl Seibert broke away from the Brooklyn defenders at 2:58 of the second period and passed to Mush March for the second Chicago goal. Brooklyn's first score was made by Summerhill at 5:35 on Ken Mosdell's assist, but the Hawks got the point back at 8:59 on Dahlstrom's angle shot.

On an unassisted play Red Hamill shot the Hawks into a 4-1 lead at 11:11 of the third period but the Americans came back at 16:03 when Tommy Anderson beat goalie Sam Lo Presti of the Hawks after Mel Hill and Buzz Boll had set up the play.

Bruins Bow To Red Wings 4-3; Bill Cowley Out With Jaw Fracture

DETROIT, Jan. 22 (AP)—Boston Bruins muffed a chance to recapture undisputed lead of the National Hockey League tonight when they bowed to Detroit Red Wings 4-3. Of greater consequence was Boston's loss of its ace playmaker, Bill Cowley, with a possible fractured jaw.

Cowley was taken to hospital for observation after being felled by a body check by Syd Howe in the first period. The Bruins, who were unbeaten in 10 games with Detroit since March 3, 1940, spotted the Red Wings a three-goal lead in the wild first period and then just missed tying it up in the final moments.

Det. Grosse got two goals and Ed Abel and Howe one each for Detroit, while Dit Clapper, Porky Dumart and Bobby Bauer tallied for Boston. Dumart rejoined the club after submitting to his army physical examination at London, Ont.
