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June 2 Is Date Set For Canadian Delegates To Sail

Bennett And Party Will Leave Friday To Attend World Parley — Rt. Hon. Sir George Perley Will Be Acting Prime Minister.

OTTAWA, May 29.—Canada's delegation to the World Economic Conference will sail for England on the liner Duchess of Bedford from Montreal on Friday next, which will enable Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and his party to have several days in London before the official opening on June 12.

Cabinet council sat this afternoon and until late in the evening, dealing with the mass of routine that accumulated during the last fortnight of the parliamentary session when all day sittings of the House of Commons was the order. No announcement was made at the conclusion beyond the statement that the council had not made any appointments.

Appointment of a Board of Trustees for the Canadian National Railways, a Royal Commission on banking and currency, and several judges, as well as three deputy ministers and other Government officials, await action by the Government but it is not expected all this will be accomplished before the Prime Minister sails. Rt. Hon. Sir George Perley, senior member of the cabinet, will be acting Prime Minister in the absence of Mr. Bennett. The Prime Minister expects to be back in Canada early in August.

Will Represent Canada At The World Parley

Wilgress, Director of the Commercial Intelligence Service, Department of Trade and Commerce; N. A. Robertson, of the External Affairs Department Secretariat; and R. K. Finlayson, Chief Secretary to the Prime Minister.

DATES SET FOR PUBLIC LECTURES

Twenty Free Public Lectures To Be Delivered From July 1 to 28 at Prince of Wales College.

MONTREAL, May 29 — (C.P.)—Plans are now complete for a course of 20 free public lectures to be delivered from July 1 to 28 at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, by Dr. Gerhard R. Lomer, librarian of McGill University and Colonel Wilfrid Bovey, director of the McGill Department of Extramural relations.

Col. Bovey's subjects include Canadian History, Canadian arts and crafts; Geography of Southern England and Western Canada, the war and French Canada.

Dr. Lomer will trace ancient civilizations up to and including the Middle Ages, other subjects being the history of printing, Chaucer and "Alice in Wonderland."

CANADIAN IS AMONG U.S. DELEGATES

Senator James Couzens, Michigan, a Canadian By Birth, Will Sail With U. S. Delegation.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(A.P.)—Accepting polite refusals from two Roosevelt Independents, President Roosevelt was reported tonight to have requested a third Republican Senator and, incidentally a Canadian by birth—James Couzens of Michigan—to be ready to sail within 48 hours with America's delegation to the London Economic Parley.

Senators Johnson of California, and La Follette of Wisconsin were invited to take part in the Conference, but declined. Whether Senator Couzens, a native of Chatham, Ont., who made a fortune in Michigan, will accept was a matter he himself declined to discuss.

With the sailing hours fast approaching, the President today called in the Conference delegates thus far definitely chosen for a White House discussion of plans.

U.S. House Passes Emergency Law

Drastic Legislation Is Passed Providing Legal Tender Money Be Used In Settlement Of Debts.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Acting with celerity, the House of Representatives today voted that legal tender money should be used henceforth in the settlement of contractual obligations of the United States Government and of the private citizen.

Passage of the bill, designed by the Roosevelt administration to give the same value to all legal tender money as was held by gold before the Government called that metal into the treasury, gave House approval to:

Payment of all private mortgages and private debts of all kinds, both past and future, in any legal tender money.

Settlement of international obligations, including war debts, in legal tender money of the United States instead of gold.

Payment of the Government's debt to private citizens, including liberty and all other government bonds, in any legal money.

A vote of 283 to 57 sent the bill to the Senate where the Banking Committee had approved it. There Democratic leaders expect early favorable action to clear the way for a large financial operation the Treasury is going to undertake shortly.

FREE STATE WILL RESPECT CONSTITUTION

Hermann Rauschnig Will Become Head of Danzig Senate — Assurance Given Poland Re Treaty.

BERLIN, May 29.—(A.P.)—The Danzig Free State will respect its constitution and its treaties under all circumstances, Hermann Rauschnig, who will become head of the Danzig Senate as a result of the Nazi victory in yesterday's elections, said today.

This assurance was calculated to quiet the fears of Poland which has been anxious lest Nazi control of Danzig lead to untoward acts.

Herr Rauschnig, who as President of the Danzig Senate will be chief of the Government, came to Berlin for a series of conferences with political leaders. Commenting on the Nazi victory at Danzig yesterday he said:

"Measures which were possible in Germany after the national revolution can be adopted in Danzig only by legislation. The Jewish problem plays no role.

"We Nazis are ready to clear the atmosphere with reference to all Polish-Danzig questions, but only on a basis of mutualty."

Bank Robbers Worth More Dead Than Alive

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 29.—Bank robbers are worth far more dead than alive. In fact the capture of Oklahoma bank robbers alive hereafter must be its own reward.

Eugene P. Gum, Secretary of the Oklahoma Bankers' Association, announced today withdrawal of the offer of a \$100 reward for the capture of each bank robber. The action was taken, he explained, to reduce the Association's expenses.

A dead bank robber still will command a premium, however. For each robber killed while in the act of raiding a bank or "in the ensuing chase" the Association will pay \$300.

The bride will wear a Paris model in blue, carrying yellow roses. Her mother will be dressed in black crepe and a corsage of white and red. The groom's mother will wear black georgette and lace with a corsage of mauve and pink.

Following the ceremony the bride and groom will leave for a brief motor tour, after which they will return to Halifax to make their home there when they will be accompanied by the good wishes of all their friends.

Will Contest Election Of Non Nazi

BERLIN, May 29.—(A.P.)—At the same time that Dr. Friedrich Von Bodelschwingh assumed his office today as First Evangelical Bishop of the Reich, his opponents, the Nazi German Christian group, gave notice they would continue to contest his appointment.

This notice took the form of a demand by the German Christian for a plebiscite of the Evangelical church membership throughout the Reich on October 31 to pass upon the question.

The Nazi Christian group declared they intend to place their candidate, Herman Mueller, before the plebiscite in opposition to the pastor who was selected by leaders of German Protestantism.

WILL ASSIST CHURCHES IN RELIEF WORK

City Council Decides to Divide \$120 a Month Among the Churches This Summer.

At a special meeting of the City Council last evening it was decided by resolution that \$120 each month during the summer be divided among the churches to supplement the poor relief of the churches.

At the opening of the meeting His Worship Mayor Stewart stated he had interviewed the clergy or representatives of various city congregations. In a number of cases he found that there were families in dire need, whom the congregations could not easily relieve, while in other congregations there was no necessity of financial assistance from the city. He had told the clergymen, His Worship stated, that the Council would not be disposed to grant any large amounts during the summer months. His Worship outlined the numbers requiring relief in the various congregations. Hon. Dr. MacMillan had expressed the opinion that as regards the Provincial and Dominion Governments contributing there would be no difficulty.

Councillor Wheat stated that the R. C. M. P. or the City Police should investigate suspicious cases and bring those guilty up for fraud. The task before the Council was to assist the Churches in taking care of the deserving poor. From the Mayor's statement it did not appear that there was any immediate need.

Councillors Trainor, Reardon and Kennedy discussed the question. The latter opposed the granting of further relief by the city, as the
