### Erin Threatened By Further Strife

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Worley storms and perhaps a bit of rifle fire are forecast for Ireland where comparative peace has existed for nearly two years. The portents of trouble are contained in unconfirmed reports that the forthcoming report of the Irish Boundary Commission will recommend that portions of Ulster be transferred to the dominion of the Free State in pursuance of the terms of the Anglo-Irish Treaty, whereby it was agreed that the boundary line should be drawn with due regard to the sympathies and ethnological differences, if any, of the persons residing on either side. Ulster, through J. M. Andrews, Minister of Labor, has commented on the report of a boundary change with the declaration that any attempt to separate Derry, Enniskillen or Newry from Ulster would be resisted by every means in the power of the Government. Andrews referred to the Ulster Government, presided over by Premier Sir James Craig. The report of the forthcoming boundary report portend greater alterations than Andrews envisaged. Part of South Armagh, a slice of Tyrone, portions of Fermanagh, excluding Enniskillen and part of Southdown, including Newry, would be removed from Ulster and given over to the Free State under the terms of the commission's findings. Ulster, in turn, would receive part of Managh and part of North Donegal. It is understood that the British and Free State governments are examining preliminary arrangements for postal and customs facilities in the transferred areas.

### Another Fatal Accident At Tignish

A fatal accident occurred about two miles from Tignish on Sunday night when Leo Conroy, son of Mr. Peter Conroy, the well known horseman of this city met instant death. It appears that four young men Messrs Joe Gaudet, A. Lynch, owner of the car, Joe Bernard and the deceased, Leo Conroy left Tignish about 1.30 Sunday afternoon for Alberton.

They spent the afternoon along the shore and it was long after dark before they continued on their way to Alberton.

When about one and a half miles out of Tignish, at Lot 2, about 9 o'clock the car was going at a high rate of speed, the driver took the turn of the road and went into the ditch the large passenger car turning completely over.

As soon as Mr. Gaudet regained his feet he went over to Conroy, whom he thought was only stunned, but on endeavoring to put him on his feet he heard him moan.

Gaudet at once secured a team and drove to a Tignish returning with the priest and doctor. It was seen at once that Conroy was dead—killed almost instantly.

There was a mark across the forehead of the deceased as though he struck the car when it overturned and also a bruise across the stomach.

Besides his father in this city he leaves to mourn his mother, two brothers and two sisters in Tignish.

Mr. Peter Conroy, father of the deceased left for Tignish yesterday morning where the funeral was held in the afternoon.

WOMEN OF ENGLAND NOW ELIGIBLE FOR HIGH POSTS IN CIVIL SERVICE  
LONDON, Aug. 31.—English women may henceforth aspire to fill the highest posts in the Civil Service, for another barrier against women's advance into professions hitherto reserved for men was removed recently when for the first time women were admitted to the difficult examinations for class I, the highest administrative grade in that service. The 31 women who are competing on equal terms with men are all university graduates, most of them from the women's colleges at Oxford and Cambridge. If they succeed they will receive appointments carrying salaries beginning with \$1,000 to \$2,000 a year, plus bonus, the same for women as for men, and they may rise by merit and seniority to permanent secretariats, where salaries range from \$15,000 to \$17,500 a year.
