Pen-Portrait of Queen Elizabeth

The Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims has been given the right to publish in Canada the pen-portrait of Queen Elizabeth, authorized and sympathetic pen-portrait of Queen Elizabeth, published in British Vogue and copyrighted 1941 by Condé Nast Publications Inc. The fund is confident that Canadians will appreciate this appeal for relief to the air raid victims of the United Kingdom. Queen Elizabeth's actions in recent months have shown how deeply she is stirred by the distress of those who suffer from the indiscriminate bombings of the Nazis. Lady Stanley of Alderley here tells in glowing words of their Majesties' devotion and courage in bringing consolation to stricken areas.

Wears Little Jewelry. Norman Hartnell, her dress-maker, finds her characteristically thoughtful in choosing her clothes. Realizing that she is small, she wears high heels and chooses pastel shades, with the express purpose of making it easier for the crowd to see her. The same principle determines her choice of hats, which must fit close to the head so that they can never cause any discomfort when worn in an open carriage and must turn off the face, so that her every expression can be seen. Since the war she has worn little jewelry, usually the same pieces, such as her pearl necklace which can be shortened or lengthened to make four or five rows, and (her particular favourite) a maple leaf in diamonds given to her by the King before they went to Canada, which she wears on the lapel of her coat. When she visits the RAF she pins in her hat a pair of diamond wings given to her by the King as an engagement present, and on other occasions regimental badges, in particular those of the various regiments of which she is colonel-in-chief. Her home also reflects her personality. When she came to the Throne she redecorated the private apartments at Buckingham Palace and Windsor in Adam green, Wedgwood blue and soft pastel shades, but in the State apartment changed little. Her rooms are filled with flowers, which Her Majesty often arranges herself. You can see in her face that it hurts her when she is given a bouquet which is bound tightly with wire, and she takes the first opportunity of liberating the strained stems. She inherits a talent for gardening from her mother, Lady Strathmore, and is clever at grouping herbaceous borders and

Interpreting The War

Simpson Associated Press Staff Writer Anglo-Greek success in holding even the Greek Island of Crete, which the Nazis say is their next objective in the Mediterranean, must turn upon the extent to which the Allies have managed to fortify and garrison it since Britain took it over at the outset of the Greek-Italian war. Adequately manned and gunned, Crete could offer formidable resistance to any invader. Presumably substantial forces of Greek and British troops are raising fierce following evacuation of the Greek mainland. Their chances of repelling invasion attempts, even of withstanding Nazi-Fascist bombing attacks, being the 70 miles or so of sea between the island and the nearest point on the Peloponnese would seem reasonably good. Crete is so important to British strength in the eastern Mediterranean that its preparation for defence must have been a first consideration. Not even the exigencies of the Balkan campaign could have induced the London authorities or the British middle east command to overlook the strategic value of Crete. There have been eye-witness accounts of British efforts to turn the island into an eastern equivalent of Gibraltar. A Nazi attempt to take Crete by invasion might be staged as a dress rehearsal for a similar attack on the United Kingdom. Yet the risk of repulse would be serious. It seems more likely that the German and Italian forces will be directed to Crete by sea. They would be screened from new blows elsewhere, possibly in the Sicilian Straits to reinforce the stalled Axis drive on the Libyan-Egyptian border.
