ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

The mail arrived on Saturday night at a quarter after ten o'clock.

The Mint goes to Pictou this week and will go on the slip for general repairs.

During the spring months the Abegweits will have football practice every Monday, Wednesday and Friday evening at 6.45 o'clock.

While shunting at Kensington on Saturday, the engine of the train coming to Charlottetown got off the track, necessitating a delay of two hours.

STEAMER Elliot sailed for St. John's, Nfld Saturday with 2562 bags oats, 1030 bags potatoes, 50 bags turnips, 30 boxes chere, shipped by Carvell Bros, 47 head cattle, 52 bags turnips and sundries shipped by Sellers & Henderson.

THE S. S. Aberdeen, of the Nova Scotia buoy service, arrived in port yesterday (Sunday) morning on her way to Quebec. She took 75 tons of coal at Pictou on Saturday and laid the buoy off Pictou yesterday morning.

PRINCE Edward Island students at Dalhousie University are most prominent on the staff for next year of the College paper Dalhousie Gazette. Half of the total staff is composed of Island students as follows:—Louis Brehaut, Murray Harbor, R. B. Forsythe, Alberton, V. H. Shaw, Brackley Point and F. W. Jardine, Free town.

THE Campana, of the Quebec Steamship Company, arrived on her first trip of the season from Montreal, Saturday, at ten o'clock. She docked as usual at Pownal wharf and brought a full cargo of general merchandise. She is loading with potatoes, oats, and eggs, and sails for Pictou and then direct to Montreal, not returning here as ordinarily.

For some time past small-pox has existed in Newfoundland and quarantine regulations have been in force in St. John's and other points. A despatch from St. John's announces that there is now no smallpox in the colony and that commencing Friday passengers arriving in Newfoundland will not require to be vaccinated. All quarantine regulations have been cancelled.

The annual turnout and parade of St. Lawrence and Willey Lodges yesterday morning to the First Methodist church was fully up to the high standard the Odd-fellows of this city have already established. The procession as it passed through the streets on the way to the church and returning to the Hall was admired by a large number of people. The service at the First Methodist was conducted by Rev. G. M. Young and a sermon appropriate to the occasion preached.

MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.

At Dundas, and within the Presbyterian Church there, on Thursday, April 23rd, and at 2 o'clock p. m. which time and place the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met pursuant to adjournment and was constituted by the Moderator pro tempore Mr. F. C. Simpson, with whom were present Messrs McKenzie, McNeil, R. McLean, McIntosh and Craise, Ministers.

Mr. J. A. McGlasban was invited to correspond.

The Clerk read the resignation of Mr. Ewen Gillies of the pastoral charge of Murray Harbor South, Little Sands and Murray River. On motion the resignation was laid on the table and the Clerk instructed to cite the session and congregation to appear for their interests at Charlottetown on the twelfth day of May next at eleven o'clock a. m.

A letter was read from Mr. Ewen Gillies, resigning the interim moderator of the session of Murray Harbor North. On motion Mr. R. G. Sinclair was appointed interim moderator of that session.

Mr. M. N. McLeod presented a Presbyterial certificate from the Presbytery of Sydney which was accepted by the Presbytery. The edict having been returned as duly served proclamation was read before the assembled congregation, and no objection being offered Mr. F. C. Simpson conducted Divine Service, preaching from 1 Tim 6:11. The moderator narrated the steps and put the usual questions, which being satisfactorily answered. Mr. M. N. McLeod was by prayer inducted into the pastoral charge of Dundas and Annandale and received the right hand of fellowship from the members of Presbytery. R. McLean addressed the newly inducted minister and Mr. McKenzie the people. Mr. McLeod having signified his willingness to subscribe to the formula it was agreed that his name be added to the roll of Presbytery. Presbytery having conferred with the elders and managers, adjourned to meet at Charlottetown and within Zion Church there on Tuesday, the 12th day of May next at 11 o'clock a. m., of which public intimation was made and this sident closed with the benediction.
