Abbies Score 6-3 Win Over Crystals In Game At S'side Last Night

Bud Lund of Charlottetown will put his Island lightweight title on the line tonight against Buddy Ramsay of Alberton in an eight-round title scrap in the Memorial Hall which will be the main go of a six-bout boxing card that will be staged there at 8:30 by promoters Poulton and Lund.

The bouts will be the opening boxing attraction of the 1950 season and have all the prospects of providing a slam-bang evening of fistie entertainment.

The semi-final attraction will be a six-round contest between two local middleweights, Louis Lafferty and Johnny O'Connor, and will be supported by four preliminary events of four-round duration. The preliminaries will include a lightweight clash between Duck Trainor and Johnny Walker, both local scrappers, a middleweight match between Emmett "Sluggo" Gallant and Johnny Russell, Royce Durrant of Summerside and Kid Connolly, City two scrappy featherweights, and another preliminary event which has not been disclosed yet.

Saints Score 7-4 Victory Over P. W. C. In Hockey League Game At Forum

A powerful first period performance by Saint Dunstan's University that netted them five goals to two, was the deciding factor that sent them on to a 7-4 victory over Prince of Wales College, in one of the best hockey matches of the season, in Island Intermediate Hockey League competition at the Forum last night.

The victory sent the Saints into a second place tie with the Victorias, four points behind the league leading Abbeys, who jumped their league lead an extra two points at Summerside last night by downing the Crystals 6-3.

Hard-working Cliff Bernard was the man who led the bulk of the Saint Dunstan's attack to rack up three goals in the first period on when Saints netted up a goal in the same session. "Kiker" McIsaac and Will Houde accounted for the other three Saints' tallies, the former snaring one and the latter two.

Arnold McCallum, Jack Brown, Gordon MacLean and MacLeod were the sharpshooters for Prince of Wales, notching up one apiece.

"The game was a wide-open, free-scoring affair that produced lots of good hockey of the fast skating, hard checking and smart passing variety.

It got off to a bang right from the early part of the first period when Saints notched up their first goal at 1:03, Bernard doing the hat-trick on a play with Mahar and MacRae, only to have P.W.C. retaliate eleven seconds later when McCallum got the equalizer on a pass from Jardine. The play remained very even for the next few minutes, until Houde and McIsaac broke out on an attack at 4:10 with Houde potting the goal to go one up. The Welshmen hammered back to the attack however and came through with the tying goal again about eight minutes later when Brown relayed Gus Downie's shot into the net from right in front.

It was the Saints' third goal 18 seconds later that started a whirlwind attack by the Saints and was the undoing of P.W.C. Teaming up with Mahar, Cliff Bernard went on the rampage to bang in two in a row, 16 seconds apart, on smart assists by Mahar and, continuing the pressure against the slumping Welshmen, came back again at 18:29, Mahar sniping a goal on an assist from Desrosiers to send them into a three-goal advantage.

Recovering from their first period setback, the Welshmen were a different team in the second and third periods, and played the Saints on even terms to shoot them one goal for one in the second, and the same again in the third. They were particularly hot in the final session, and held the advantage on the play through most of the period to come up with at least four chances to the Saints one on scoring attempts, but lacked the ability to finish off their plays in the way that had up in goals. The Saints, who had less scoring opportunities, showed more finish around the net.

The teams played clean hockey, although plenty rough at times, to go without penalties in the first and third periods. They roughened it up a bit in the sandwich session however, that brought on five penalties, all for minor infractions.
