HON. MESSRS DAVIES AND BLAIR.

The people of Summerside, having had the privilege of listening to the Opposition Leader, Sir Charles Tupper, and his first lieutenant, Hon. George E. Foster, are on Monday next to enjoy the pleasure of hearing two of the Liberal Ministers, Sir Louis H. Davies and Hon. Andrew G. Blair. These two gentlemen hold prominent departments in the Government of the country, are foremost men of their respective provinces, and are in the front rank among the public men of the Liberal party sitting in Parliament. They are nearly of the same age. Mr. Blair was born in Fredericton in March 1844 and Sir Louis Davies had his birth in Charlottetown in May of the following year. Sir Louis is and has long been a familiar figure throughout Prince Edward Island. Hon. Mr. Blair, we believe has not yet addressed a public meeting in this Province, though he has several times visited it.

Both these Ministers are lawyers by profession, both were called to the bar in the same year, 1866, and both have been in service in Provincial and Federal affairs. Sir Louis, though slightly the younger, was the first to hold a representative position. He was elected to the House of Assembly in 1872; Mr. Blair made his entry to the New Brunswick Assembly in 1878. Sir Louis became Premier of his Province in 1876, before Mr. Blair was first elected. Mr. Blair became Leader of the Opposition almost at his entrance to the House, but the Opposition was then composed of only eight men in a House of 41 members. After the next general election he captured the Government and became Premier in 1883. That position he retained for thirteen years, until in 1896 he was called upon to accept the post of Minister of Railways, and enter the Federal Parliament for the first time. Sir Louis Davies has had a seat in the Commons since 1882. In the extent to which he has become known and attained distinction at home, throughout Canada, in the Mother Country, and at Washington Sir Louis Davies is easily the foremost public man the Island has yet produced. And in his own Province of New Brunswick it may be questioned whether in more than a century of its history any other man ever held the same large measure of control for so long a time as Hon. A. G. Blair.

Both the Ministers who are to speak at Summerside are able and engaging public speakers, and debaters, but different in their manner and methods. Sir Louis is the more versatile as well as the more aggressive; Mr. Blair the more commanding and subtle. Sir Louis has always been a straight party man. Mr. Blair, though always a Liberal, for thirteen years led a Provincial Government in which half his colleagues were Conservative, and there acquired a tactful moderation that enabled him to work always harmoniously with them. Notwithstanding the sharp attacks of the Conservative press, Mr. Blair has always had and still retains a considerable share of Conservative support throughout his province. In no province of the Dominion will so many formerly prominent Conservatives support the Liberal leader of the Province as in New Brunswick.

THE GUARDIAN shares the common pride of Maritime Province people in the large number of exceedingly able public men of both parties which the eastern section of Canada has produced. Far beyond proportion to our population is the number of men who stand in the front rank of the two parties as represented in Parliament. Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. Mr. Foster are fair representatives of the Conservative side in that regard. And Sir Louis Davies and Hon. Mr. Blair, are men of whom the Liberal Party are deservedly proud. To their distinguished abilities and know-

ledge of public affairs is added the strength and regard which come to public men whose private life is above reproach.

Col. McMillan, the newly appointed Governor of Manitoba, was Provincial Treasurer in the late Greenway Administration and represented Winnipeg in the Legislature from 1880 to 1890. He was born in Ontario in 1846, took part in the defence of Ontario against the Fenian Raid on the Niagara frontier in 1838; joined the Red River expedition in 1870 as Major and was promoted to the command of the 95th Battalion. He settled in Winnipeg in 1878 and conducted a large grain milling business.

An Ottawa despatch tells that the contract for erecting the Hillsborough bridge has been let to M. J. Haney of Toronto, the contract price being nearly a million dollars. This involves a very large outlay of public money and a large employment of labor in our midst within two years to come. In a comparatively small community like ours this should give a decided impetus to both trade and industry. It is gratifying to know that both the bridge and the Belfast Railway are now assured beyond peradventure.

Both these wants ought to be supplied. The latest directory furnishes the proper numbers for every dwelling and lot in the city and it would be well for owners to procure the metal numbers and have them placed on their doors. The Women's Council as well as THE GUARDIAN long ago urged upon the City Fathers the necessity for posting the names of streets.

Rambles in an Ancient Colony, Book 1 is the title of a sumptuous volume of 110 large illustrated pages. The Ancient Colony is Newfoundland. The writer of the book is Mr. James Rupert Elliott of Annapolis, N. S., who has come to the front as one of the most promising of Canadian writers. His previous books of note were Rambles in Merrie England (in five parts) and American Farms. The latter volume attracted the attention of Mr. Gladstone, a fac simile of whose autograph notice is appended to the volume before us. The Rambles in Newfoundland describe The Approach to the Island by the Steamer Bruce, crossing from Sydney; Cape Ray and the Treaty Coast to the Bay of Islands; Two Charming Days at a Newfoundland Outport; Crossing the Ancient Colony by Rail; and the author's Arrival and First Impressions at St. John's. A large portion of the book is devoted to the railway trip across the Island. Mr. Elliott is at once an alert, independent and dispassionate observer, who sees with the eye of an artist and a philosopher all the natural beauties of the scenes he traverses, and describes what he sees with a quiet grace of style which to the better class of readers is very engaging. His book is packed full of information about Newfoundland, its scenery and natural features, its fisheries, forests, minerals, game and productive possibilities; the disabilities arising from French treaty rights, its railway and industrial development, and all that pertains to the life of the people. But this fund of information is imparted incidentally and the reader absorbs it by the way while making a journey with the genial and sympathetic companionship of the author. We know of no way in which one can so pleasantly learn so much about Newfoundland as by reading Mr. Elliott's book. There are abundant and beautiful illustrations which further adorn the otherwise attractive narrative and descriptive matter. Residents of Newfoundland cannot fail to be pleased with the just and appreciative spirit in which the book is written, and all who are privileged to read this first book will await with deep interest the appearance of the coming numbers of the series.
