Local Marksman One Of 13 Qualifying For Second Stage Of Shoot

BISLEY CAMP, Surrey, England, July 13 — (CP) — Thirteen Canadians today qualified outright for the second stage of the King's prize, biggest individual event of the annual Commonwealth rifle shoot.

Lt. Col. J. Neal Dow of Windsor, N.S., one of the qualifiers and a Bisley veteran, said it was the largest number of Canadian riflemen ever to reach the second stage of the coveted award.

Three other Canadians, including one unofficial competitor, will shoot off Thursday with 90 other marksmen to determine the last 77 of the 300 top scorers who qualify for the second stage Friday.

Sgt. Frederick Wallace of Toronto, making his first trip to Bisley, led the Canadians with 102 out of a possible 105 in the first stage. Shooting under excellent conditions, the contestants in the opening stage fired seven shots each at 200, 500 and 600 yards.

Wallace fired 34 at 200 yards, a perfect 35 at 500 yards and 33 at 600.

Ft. Sgt. John R. Sullivan of Edmonton and Capt. Richard Hampton of Ottawa each scored 34 at 200 yards, 34 at 500 and 33 at 600, for totals of 101.

The scores of the other outright Canadian qualifiers, including count at 200, 500 and 600 yards and aggregate score respectively:

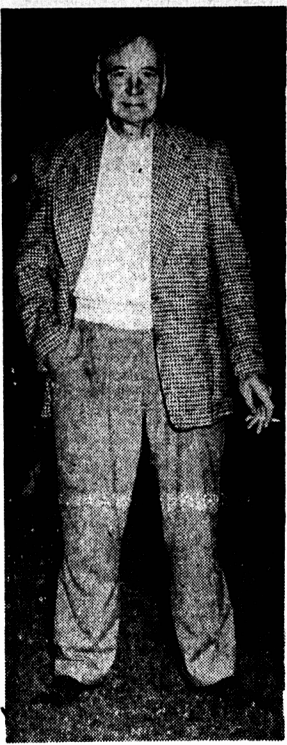

Sgt. William Hall, Ottawa, Sgt. Godfrey Kay, Hamilton, Ont., and Sgt. Earl Jamieson, Vancouver, an unofficial competitor, each had aggregate of 95. That puts them in Thursday's shoot-off.

Lt.-Col. Dow, now making his sixth visit to Bisley, was happy about the showing of the 18-man Canadian team in qualifying 13 men outright.

"And the two shooting off (Hall and Kay, members of the official team) will make it 15, he grinned. In the second stage of the King's prize competition Friday the 300 survivors will fire 10 shots each at distances of 300, 500 and 600 yards, making 30 shots in all.

On the basis of aggregate scores, the 100 top competitors will go into the final stage Saturday, in which 15 shots are fired at 300 yards and 15 at 1,000 yards. The contestant with the top aggregate score is the winner.

In the Island League Emmett Mulholland, latest addition to the Curran & Briggs roster, has slammed out 5 hits in 10 trips, but he also hasn't played in enough games to place him with the bluebloods of batting in the Island circuit. Mulholland is a past master in the art of bunting, and is a valuable man to have at the plate when the "squeeze" play is on.

Speaking of "squeeze" plays reminds us that we read an article about them lately. The writer divided the play into two classes, the "suicide squeeze" and the "delayed squeeze." In the "suicide squeeze" the runner at third dashes madly for the plate, and it is up to the batter to hit the ball, foul or fair, or the runner is a dead pigeon. In the "delayed squeeze" the runner advances part way, far enough to score if the bunt is a good one, but not too far so that he has a chance to get back to third if the hit is popped, or the batter fails to touch the ball. The article went on to say that it is rarely a good idea to try the "suicide squeeze" as the chances of success are not very good. The "delayed squeeze," the writer said, is more widely used and is successful more often.

In these parts the "suicide squeeze" has worked a surprisingly large percentage of the time, and this may be because the
