Emile Brunet, born in Montreal, in the bronze statue created by him in Paris, in which he has caught a notable expression of the Liberal chieftain. The simplicity and dignity of the figure will be emphasized by the inscription on the front of the base, which reads simply: "Laurier, 1841-1919." The statue stands on the south-west corner of Parliament Hill, overlooking Connaught place and the Rideau canal. It is nine feet high, the total width of the base being 18 feet 4 inches, on a sub-base of two broad steps. The unveiling ceremony was presided over by the young Canadian sculptor, J. Ice.

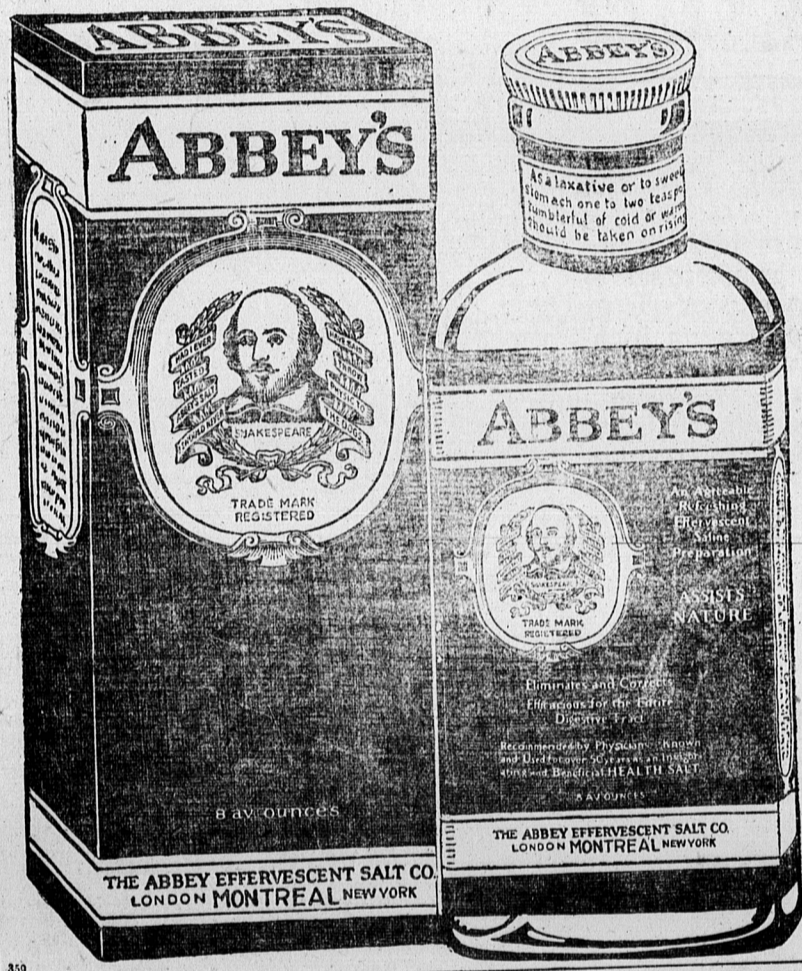

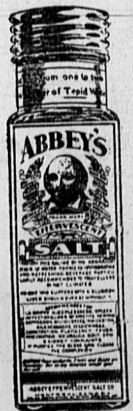

LANDSLIDE IN THE HEART OF LONDON

(By British United Press)

LONDON, July 6.—Four hundred tons of bricks, gravel and steel girders and a great steam crane crushed into a pit fifty feet deep in a landslide in the heart of London at four o'clock in the morning recently.

Half of the roadway of Wilson Street, a thoroughfare thirty feet wide, which runs parallel to Long Acre, W.C., subsided, and fell into a crater excavated for the purpose of erecting a new extension building for a firm of printers and publishers, whose main printing works are on the other side of the street.

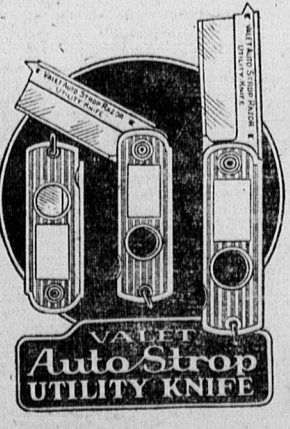
A street lamp-post, gas and water pipes, and electric light and telephone cables were hurled into the abyss by the avalanche, which carried with it tons of scaffolding and steel work. The damage is estimated at \$50,000.
