IMPATIENCE OF CRITICISM.

All patriotic citizens must desire for the Empire the Dominion and the Province the best Government that can be secured. It is not very much that one man or one newspaper can do to that end, but each is in duty bound to do what he can. The best friend of the Government of the day is he who seeks to keep it in the right path. It is with Governments as with individuals. They can only be seriously harmed by their own acts.

All Governments, whether Liberal or Conservative are fallible and yield from time to time to improper influences. It is regrettable that all of them are also impatient of criticism, though the object of all honest criticism is amendment and salvation. The Guardian has never yet sought the present defeat or destruction of a Government. On the contrary we have steadfastly endeavored to get the best possible administration from the party in power, whatever that party might happen to be. That is our attitude toward the Federal and Provincial Governments today.

"That man's the true Conservative who lops the mouldering branch away." The man who prunes the tree in his orchard is not the enemy of the tree, although he inflicts a wound for the time. The best friend of a wayward youth is not the companion who applauds and commends him in wrongdoing. Rather is the best friend he is found in him who gives the timely warning and honest counsel to amend. And it is thus with Governments. The Guardian has never yet offered counsel or warning to the Provincial Government or the Federal Government except in a friendly spirit.

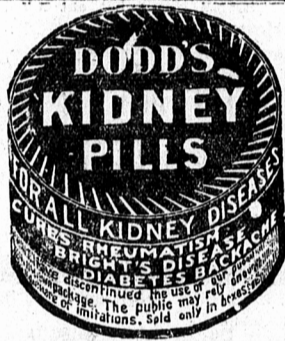
Our good intentions may be misunderstood or angrily resented. That will make no difference in our future course. We have condemned nothing which we do not honestly believe to be wrong, commended nothing that we did not believe to be good, or beneficial or useful. Governments and parties, the same as individuals of ten mistake their real friends. They grow impatient of friendly criticism instead of profiting by it. The end of such a course may be disaster which might easily be avoided. It is always worth while for a government as for an engine driver to watch for the green signal lights which call for caution and to stop when the red signal tells of danger. These are friendly signals.

"THE ISLAND'S NEED."

The people of Prince Edward Island have had occasion from time to time to feel grateful for the intelligent and sympathetic words of influential newspapers on the Mainland in regard to our transportation difficulties and the one obvious remedy. The leading newspapers of St. John representing both political parties have been especially kind in that respect and have supported the Tunnel on the broad ground that all-rail connection of the three Eastern Provinces ought properly to be considered as a national concern the considerable expenditure for which would certainly not more than fairly balance the large past, present and prospective expenditure in the west.

In its latest issue the St. John Telegraph deals with the question of the Tunnel from the standpoint of "Prince Edward Island's Need," which is another aspect of the question, in part as follows:

"It must be set down as one of the facts of the day that a Tunnel and a Tunnel only will satisfy the Island. More, a Tunnel is the only means of giving continuous steam communication, and nothing short of that will do the Island justice, give it a chance to develop its fine resources, and enable it to take its proper place as a member of the Canadian family. The Islanders have been fed upon promises from Ottawa, some definite, some indefinite, their color changing as one winter season multiplied the Island's disabilities or another diminished them. The people are now—were long ago, indeed—entitled to a few plain words on this Tunnel matter from the government of the day. The administration should say yes or no, and if yes it should set to work proving that it means what it says."



MAIL ORDERS AT HOME.

It is pleasing to note the intimation that a number of the leading merchants of this city and province are further developing the mail order business in connection with their trade. They have tried it in a limited measure with good results, to their own satisfaction and that of their customers, and the extension comes easily and naturally.

It is beyond question that our local merchants are much better informed as to the wants and requirements of purchasers resident in this province than are the merchants of distant cities. They can supply their customers by mail in much shorter time, and, having in view the quality and suitableness of their goods, quite as cheaply and more satisfactorily.

We see no reason why a very large trade may not be developed along mail order lines within this province that will grow and expand in the years to come. The parcel post is available to our merchants as to those of the larger Canadian cities. The people are already to a considerable extent educated in doing their shopping by mail and as the demand grows along that line it is commendable enterprise to meet that demand.

The Guardian is charged with being 'impertinent' in saying that public men of the better class prefer frank criticism to 'sloberly laudation.' The sentence may not be elegant, but we think it quite pertinent to the question under discussion. According to the best dictionary we have at hand and "sloberly" means "muddy; lippy." Swift applied it to the weather at a time of thaw in winter—"it was something sloberly," but if this be not satisfactory to you our evening contemporary we will heartily withdraw the phrase and substitute "fulsome laudation."

George Cresceus (2 yrs) 2481-4

Something about the great Cresceus King of trotters and Sire of George Cresceus. In the first place there is the fact that Cresceus is Cresceus. His mere name, when flung in the balance, outweighs those of all the other trotting stallions whose names the golden tongue of fame has uttered. His deeds, his achievements—they are household words wherever the word is known or heard. The gap that separates him from all others of his gait and speed is known as the "Eclipse" first and the rest nowhere. Over again, it is unnecessary to stop and enumerate his long list of world's records. Everybody can show a dozen greater. For one great thing that any other trotting stallion has ever done, he shows them by heart. His career is thickly studded with stars, but one of which would be sufficient to confer celebrity on any other horse. With him they are only parts of a "stupendous whole"—a greatness so colossal as to be without precedent or parallel. He was—or is—distinctly a "wearing power." In the sum of his attributes, some horses—as some men—seem to transcend the limits which nature, as we conceive it, has set. Of these is Cresceus. Every trotter that he is a stallion—THE ONLY STALLION THAT EVER HAS HELD THE WORLD'S TROTTERING RECORD.

George Cresceus 42246, whose 2-year-old outpaces above, is a handsome chestnut horse of splendid conformation, Sired by Cresceus and is gaited and packed six which he won at Halifax after a few weeks training, thus proving that "blood will tell."
