ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

THE debt on the Hampton public hall has been completely paid off from the receipts of the recent concert which was such a great success. At the concert \$125 was realized and the promoters are to be congratulated upon their efforts.

THE theatrical colony at Freeport, L. I. was greatly surprised yesterday by the announcement that Mrs. Natta Stromberg, widow of John Stromberg, former musical director for Weber & Fields will be married on Easter Sunday to Charles A. Strmond. Mrs. Stromberg met Mr. Strmond, who is a real-estate broker of Freeport and who had charge of her property on the island, about two years ago. He had frequently consulted her about her estate and at last an attachment grew up between them. He is several years her junior. [The late Mr. Stromberg was a native of Charlottetown where his parents and other relatives still reside.]

PREACHERS' Association. The Preachers' Association met in the First Methodist Church, Charlottetown on Monday, March 7th, at 2.30 p. m. The Rev. R. Ople was present, and in the chair; present also were J. T. Mellish, Sec., Revs. Geo. M. Young, W. B. Thomas, Thomas Hinks, Frank R. Frizzle, Messrs N. Peardon, Henry Rackham, John Prowse and Henry McKenzie. The matter of reviewing the work of the past quarter was proceeded with, also the work of perfecting the plan of appointments for the next quarter and preparing said plan for the press. Some practical suggestions were made with a view to further aiding and facilitating the arduous and self-denying labors of the local preachers. The Association adjourned at 4.30 p. m., to meet in the church at Clifton Lot 48, on the last Monday in May.

PERSONS going to Prince Edward Island are often unable to obtain satisfactory information here regarding connections for Pictou. Only a few days ago local officials were announcing that in order to connect with the steamers leaving Pictou at 7 o'clock in the morning passengers would have to leave St. John on the morning train on the previous day. It was stated that the noon express would not connect. This is incorrect. The noon express leaving here for Halifax transfers mails and passengers at Truro to a special which runs direct to Pictou. The Minto and Stanley are making fairly regular trips, although Northumberland Straits are almost completely blocked with ice. This is in large fields, and the crossing is at present most difficult. Since Wednesday last the steamers have crossed regularly, but even a slight change in the direction of the wind may at any time block the steamers for days.—St. John Sun.
