STOCK QUOTATIONS

Stock Markets At A Glance

CHICAGO, Jan. 24 (AP)—Grain markets dropped sharply at the start today but recovered quickly with the support of short covering and resting demand.
MONTREAL, Jan. 24 (CP)—Led by papers a majority of issues moving toward lower terrain today on the Stock Exchange and Curb Market in amplification of the current easier tone on average on the market. All pivotal groups were down in the average except golds which moved up a trifle. Individual losses were small.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 24 (CP)—United Kingdom buyers purchased a small lot of durum wheat today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, while United States buyers took a lot of rye.
 In the coarse grain pit, may rye displayed independent strength and advanced over previous closing levels after early weakness. Trading was moderately active in other options.

TORONTO, Jan. 24 (CP)—The gold stocks developed a strong market this afternoon on the Toronto Exchange after showing moderate weakness in the morning session. The group had an index gain of .35 at the close. Index losses were posted by the Base Metals and the Western Oils were unchanged in the average at the end of the session.
 A half-dozen of the cheaper gold stocks traded in unusually heavy volume. Abelle had turnover of 100,000 shares and it firmed 3 1/2 cents to 41. Transcontinental resources traded 60,000 shares and advanced 14 cents to 1.94 and Chesterville traded 37,000 and gained 18 cents to 2.29.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24 (AP)—Rail leaders advanced in the stock market today and a variety of other issues improved fractionally before the recovery moved stalled.
 Dome Mines was strong in the Canadian section, closing with a net gain of 1-2. C.P.R. was up 1-8 and McIntyre moved ahead 3-8. Southern railway, put on a regular dividend basis Tuesday, paced the move and was up 1-2. Santafe, Great Northern, Delaware and Hudson—which was up 1-3-4 and New York Central followed.

Killed In Action

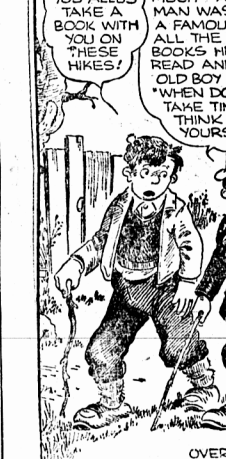

 On January 17th there passed away at her home in French River Mrs. Josiah Howatt, at the unusually advanced age of 76 years.

Despite her great age she remained very active until about two years ago, since which time she gradually declined in health until the call came to relinquish this world's cares and enter into her eternal rest.
 Of her seven children, five survive: Mrs. Tremaine Best, Dawson City; Mrs. Annie Sims, Kensington; P.E.I.; Elizabeth Howatt, Burlington, N.E.I.; Irving Howatt, M.A., K.C., Edmonton, Alberta, and Bruce Howatt, K.C., Westsaskatoon, Alberta. There are left to mourn fifteen grandchildren and eleven great-grand children. One son, Omer, farmer, and her youngest daughter Vivian, (Mrs. Wm. E. Johnstone), predeceased her. Of a large family of brothers and sisters only one sister, Mrs. Hayes, Tormentine, N.B., survives.
 Her funeral, which was largely attended was held from her late home on Friday, Jan. 19th. Rev. E. J. O. Fraser conducted the service, taking for his discourse the 15th verse of the 136th psalm, "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of one of His saints," a most fitting text.
 The hymns sung were all old favorites of the deceased, "The Lord Is My Shepherd"; "Abide With Me"; and "Peace, Perfect Peace."

St. Johns Church

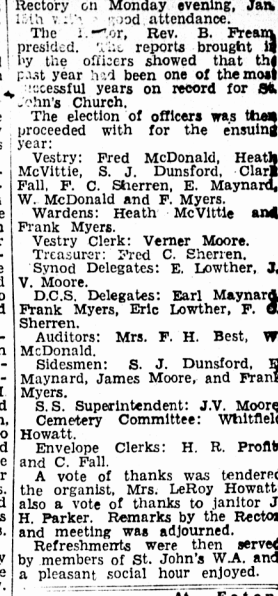
The annual meeting of St. John's Church, Craupaud, was held at the Rectory on Monday evening, Jan. 15th. Good attendance.

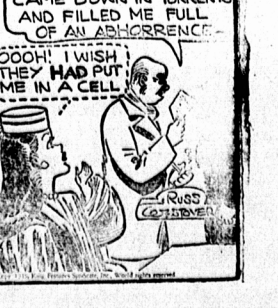
