KINDLY WORDS FOR PROVINCIALIST

Who Was Head of the Dawson City Police Force for Years. Now Visiting This Province.

The Guardian had a pleasant call yesterday from Allan A. McMillan, of Dawson City, who is visiting his parents Eben and Mrs. McMillan, Wood Island. Mr. McMillan says that the climate in Dawson City at present is very cold, he having left that city on Oct. 11th in the last boat of the season on the Yukon River. The summer however is delightful, and for about three months there is continuous day, the air also is very dry and healthy. Newspapers in Dawson are a luxury, although there are two or more printed. For instance those in the city have to pay twenty five cents for a copy of the weekly paper while a citizen of the United States would be charged one dollar for the same issue. Mr. McMillan, who leaves shortly on return to his far away home says there are quite a number of Provincialist in and about Dawson whom he knows intimately. The following is taken from The Dawson Weekly News and tells of Mr. McMillan's success of which his Provincial friends feel justly proud.

"Sergeant Allan A. McMillan in charge of the Dawson Police Force purchased his release from the Royal Northwest Mounted Police and is now a private citizen. He retired from the force to engage in the conduct of the mercantile business in Quartz Creek with A. D. Ross a native of Nova Scotia formerly of the Dawson customs force. They bought the business of Ole Tystad. Mr. McMillan joined the police force eight years ago and spent the last seven years in Dawson, during which he has been identified with much of the best work done in the Yukon for the preservation of law and order. Sergeant McMillan was one of the most reliable and efficient men who ever enlisted in the forces and reles with a splendid record in the organization from beginning to end. The organization always regrets the retirement of its experienced and proven men, but the regret in this case is especially felt."

REGENT WILL NOT STAYD FEMININE INTERFERENCE

PEKIN, Nov. 23.—Reforms have already been instituted in the palace. The new Dowager Empress Yehonala, has withdrawn herself to the back-ground and the late dowager's influence and hers who were closely identified with her powerful and dominating rule, becoming alarmed at the evidences of the reform movement and anticipating discharge, have fled. Prince Chun's recent edict, in which he declined to permit any interference from the Dowager Empress, Yehonala, has cleared the throne from any possible domination of the clan of women at least until the new emperor, Prince Pu Yi, assumed power. This edict, which ordered all imperial clansmen to give a greater degree of obedience to the regent than others, and which threatened disobeying Princes and officials with severe punishment, indicates the government's recognition of the present opportunity for a palace house-cleaning. Yuan Shi Kai, it is understood, is co-operating with Chang Chi Tung, who is acting as the regent's chief councillor.
