SAYS CANADA ACTED WHILE U. S. SLEPT

Under the caption "Canada Acted," the Des Moines (Iowa) Register of July 20, comments on the fact that Canada has placed over 25,000 returned men on the land with loans amounting to over \$50,000,000. "It," says the Register, "we look at nothing in this statement but the concluding reference to men placed on farms and credit extended to them we shall see how intelligently our northern neighbors have set about doing something that we are doing badly or not at all. Considering that Canada was in the war for four years, that the national debt per capita is very great in Canada, that relatively Canada has had a far larger number of men to care for, there is something reassuring in a prompt extension of credit of more than \$50,000,000 to the boys who fought to get them properly cared for as farmers. This is in perfect keeping with the general Canadian policy."
