### THE POTATO QUESTION.

The letter of Prof. Readey which appears elsewhere in this issue may call forth both approval and some dissent. There can be no question as to the soundness of his contention that farmers should adopt methods of cropping and feeding that would as far as practicable restore to the soil the nutrient elements which the growing crops take from it.

The farm is the farmer's bank and the bank cannot on business principles permit him to cheque out of it more than he from time to time deposits therein. But as between oats and potatoes, our two largest field crops, it would be hard to say which had been the means of most impoverishing the farms by being sold abroad. Both these crops have been very largely exported.

It is true that the oat straw is mostly kept at home, and fed or in some manner returned to the soil. The same is true of the undersized and otherwise unmerchantable potatoes, which with the bran from ground grain, the skimmed milk from the dairy, or whey from the cheese factory afford the cheaper materials for the making of pork. If the farmer sells what is merchantable both of oats and potatoes, there is, as we have said, little to choose.

We do not quite agree with Prof. Readey's estimate that land which will produce 250 bushels of potatoes will produce 70 bushels of oats. Much will depend, of course, on the nature of the soil, and of the season. Most farmers we think would figure the average production as nearer 250 of potatoes to 60 of oats. This would materially modify his calculation, but we need not follow this further.

A field of potatoes calls for much more time and labor in planting, cultivating and harvesting than a field of like size sown to oats. The extra labor is probably not more than compensated by the greater value of the crop as compared with oats. But there are other compensations. One of these is the eradication of weeds, which tend to multiply where grain is cultivated to the exclusion of potatoes and root crops.

And the repeated stirring of the soil induced by potato planting, cultivating and the harvesting process is of some thing more than momentary advantage. Moreover the labor devoted to the potato field comes mainly at times not required for other farm work, gives some employment to children and is therefore more economically done than if it came in the rush of grain sowing, haying or grain harvest, and could only be performed by adult workers. These are minor points, but worth considering.

Without wishing to be hypercritical we might gently join issue with Prof. Readey on the last paragraph in his letter. Agriculture is our greatest industry; potatoes have been a leading farm crop. Why should not the Department of Agriculture take an interest in its improvements and assist in preparing the way for introducing the seed of better paying varieties? Governmental leadership and supervision did much for the dairy industry and has done something to improve live stock in all the Provinces. Why may it not point the way to better things even in potato growing?

And Miss Roosevelt was married on Saturday, which as the old rhyme runs, was "no day at all" to be married upon. We must admire the spirit which sets aside the nonsense about one day being better than another for birth or marriage. Any day of the week is a good day for the marriage of a good man and a good woman who from mutual affection have chosen each other as life partners.

A correspondent inquires about the population and debt of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The following figures give the population by the last census and the net debt as it was in 1904:

Population	Net Debt.
Nova Scotia, 459,574	\$4,446,771
New Brunswick 341,129	3,415,634

The net debt was then \$9.61 per head in Nova Scotia and \$10.21 per head in New Brunswick. In both Provinces the debt has been somewhat increased since 1904.

### FREDERICK W. HALES.

The death of Mr. Hales, for forty years the Secretary of the Steam Navigation Company occurred on Saturday. It was learned with deep regret by the wide circle in which he known and respected.

Mr. Hales was born near London, England in 1820, came to this Province in 1850, engaged for some years in farming and milling near York and later removed to Charlottetown where he became connected with the business of Hon. D. Davies. In 1866 he was appointed Secretary of the Navigation Company which position he retained till his demise.

He was a devout member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, and lived an exemplary Christian life, ever seeking in a quiet unobtrusive way the betterment of those with whom he came in contact. The universal feeling in regard to his demise is that a good man has gone to his reward.

The deceased gentleman had been in impaired health for some time past, but was only confined to his bed for a brief period of two days. The end came somewhat suddenly, but this may be counted not undesirable to one who has lived so long and well.

Mr. Hales was married in 1833 to Miss Jenkins, daughter of a former Rector of St. Paul's. Two daughters and three sons survive him. These are, Mrs. T. C. James and Mrs. W. D. Pollock of this city, and Henry, Frederick and Arthur in Minnesota. The Guardian tenders to them its respectful sympathy.

## Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 20 and 28, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
