ADDRESS ON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH WORK

The following interesting address on the Presbyterian church was delivered by Rev. G. M. Dunn at Zion Church Sunday evening:

As early as the year 1800 there were a number of branches of the Presbyterian church in Canada. When our fathers came to this land to seek their fortunes they brought with them their faith and like the Patriarchs of old wherever they sojourned there they raised their altars and established their church. During the half century between 1817 and 1870 there were a number of unions of these branches of Presbyterianism. In 1875 the remaining four came together, two of these were in the Maritimes and two in Canada. It was a voluntary organization holding Presbyterian Doctrine and Government. They came together in a voluntary manner and called themselves by the only logical name they could, viz. The Presbyterian Church in Canada. They were not incorporated nor did they seek incorporation. They asked no one's permission and no one questioned their right. They were Presbyterians and they were in Canada, and what else could they be but the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

There followed then a half century of progress of success. The Presbyterian Church established itself in all parts of the rapidly growing country and established herself in the hearts of the people. At the union of 1875 she reported a membership of 83,223 with a total revenue of \$982,672. From this she grew to a membership of some 375,000, with a total income of \$9,000,000.

Then came the crisis of 1925 when after some twenty years of agitation the Union of June 10th was consummated and many ministers and members went over into the newly incorporated body The United Church of Canada, taking with them much property, and sacred possessions of our people.

Another era now begins and the Presbyterian Church of 1875 gathers together remaining forces and continues on. Though reduced in number of ministers and members, and handicapped for churches she rallied around the same old standards that had accompanied the fathers to this country a century before. "When the war drums beat no longer and the battle flags furled" it was found that 793 congregations had by their vote decided to remain as Presbyterian and in the four years succeeding there were added to that number 505 congregations making at the end of 1928, 1300 congregations.

A period of remarkable progress followed June 10, 1925. It is doubtful if the church ever manifested such progress in any four years of her history. The year 1928 showed a marked increase in every department over 1927. Her givings for ministers' stipends for Missionary and Benevolent funds—Congregational purposes—receipts for all purposes showed marked advance over 1927, while Budget Funds increased over \$60,000. Looking back to 1910 a time when the church was in a normal and undivided condition, we find the receipts for all purposes did not reach the year of 1928 by

\$161,430, and this in the face of all her recent handicaps.

The Presbyterian Church at the present time shows a numerical strength as follows:
180,000 members.
677 Ministers.
1,300 Congregations.
5,830 Elders.
122,000 Boys and Girls in our Sunday Schools.
11,279 Teachers and Officers.
90,000 Families.
An increase in three years—
119 Ministers.
1,001 Elders.
12,054 Families.
22,498 Members.

6,500 children received the rite of Baptism and 7,893 new members were received into the church on Profession of Faith. There are 182 Mission fields in Canada under the Presbyterian church, with 339 preaching stations, and last March the General Board of Missions sent out 200 members to preach the Gospel in these fields.

The Commission assigned to us in 1927, five general fields for Foreign Mission Work and for these our church is responsible.

Formosa.—That well known island 90 miles south east of China. It has four million of a population, and was first opened up by Rev. George P. McKay in 1871. We are responsible for at least 1,300,000 people in that island where we have 8 churches, 46 congregations and 5,000 members.

India.—With its two great fields. The Bill—Where our past Moderator, Dr. Buchanan has spent so much of his life, and to which he still cherished the hope to return.

The Gwalior.—Where John Wilkie spent his life—leaving the field at the earnest solicitation of his friends only to die at sea on his return home and to be buried in the Mediterranean.

Then we have Manchuria, where Jonathan Goforth is holding the ground in the midst of much unsettlement and threatened warfare. From all of these comes a most insistent call for more Missionaries and more helpers and more equipment. We have half a million Koreans in Japan mostly factory workers, where a most important work is being carried on. British Guiana of the north shore of South America, with some 20,000, chiefly East Indian slaves, offers another great opportunity for service.

Our Home Field, with its boundless areas of new territory to be opened up, is in great need of men for new fields in the north and west that ought to be opened.

We therefore have a great church and a great field, and our first duty and responsibility is to carry the Gospel to the millions who are as "Hungry sheep that look up and are not fed." The great commission is not from Assembly or any Board but from Him Who is the King of kings, and His command is: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

Paul says: "How can they hear without a preacher, and how can they preach except they be sent?" The Budget is just that thing without which they cannot be sent—without which the church cannot function. The maintenance of our work at home and abroad depends upon the Budget Funds. Our colleges and schools to train men for the ministry and our girls for deaconesses and missionaries depend upon the Budget.

There are 316 Augmented churches that need aid from the Budget. There are 339 preaching stations in our Home Mission Fields that depend upon the Budget. In a word, half of our entire congregations depend more or less upon the Budget to keep the church doors open that the Gospel may be preached.

The church of our fathers issues a challenge to our Presbyterian church of today. A challenge to our manhood, to our life and to our character. A challenge comes to our loyalty, to our church, as they were loyal to the divine Christ and our risen Lord. A challenge to our Christian Stewardship, and our loyalty to the trust vested in us. All things are His. We are not our own but are bought with a price. We are but the administrators of an estate, all of which belongs to God and we must be careful lest we be found unfaithful stewards.

The apostolic method of attaining it all has never been improved upon. His statement of the Scriptural method of financing the church as set forth in 16th chap. of 1st Corinthians, is very simple and very just and equitable to all. "Upon the first day of the week let everyone lay by him in store, as God has prospered." The practical application of this divine exhortation is the weekly duplex envelope where everyone gives of the first day of every week just as God has prospered.

Brethren, we have a living church, a living word, a living Christ. Let us present ourselves as living sacrifices wholly acceptable unto God which is a reasonable service.
