**Adjourned Meeting S' Side Council**

(Special to the Guardian)

**SUMMERSIDE, March 24**—An adjourned meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held tonight with His Worship the Mayor presiding over a full council board. After routine bills amounting to \$625 were passed and on motion of Councillor McNeill, the resolution passed at the previous meeting re the issue of debentures to pay for the new engine of the electric plant was allowed to stand for 18 years instead of 20 years. A by-law moved by Councillor Grady was passed relating to neglected children. It provides that any child under the age of 16 years found in any public place within the town after 7 o'clock at night unaccompanied by a parent or guardian and who fails to go home after being warned by an officer, may be taken to his home or to a children's shelter. Any parent may be summoned for permitting such children to violate this by-law to appear in the police court. For the first offence a fine of \$1 is provided, for second offence \$2 for third or any subsequent offence \$5.

On motion it was resolved to purchase a quantity of lumber for repairs to the east end slip; that the salary of the Sundry Magistrate be fixed at \$350 and of the Recorder at \$150 and that water and sewerage commissioner be paid \$150 a year between them. The resignation of Chief of Police Murray and police officer

Linkletter to take effect on the 31st instant were received and accepted. It was agreed in answer to a letter from the Secretary of the Summerside Rifle Club to allow the establishment of a miniature range in the basement of the B. I. Rayner Building in accordance with the Dominion Government rules.

It was moved by Councillor Schurman and carried that in recognition of the long and faithful service of Mr. J. H. Massey as town clerk, he should upon retirement, whenever he so desire, be granted a pension of \$600 a year. Councillor Moore promised that with the new police organization he hoped to take the dog nuisance in hand. On the recommendation of the Fire Department it was decided to purchase a six cylinder international truck for the chemical engine now on order. Councillors Schurman, MacNeill and Phillips were appointed a committee to wait upon the local government and protest against the Telephone Company being exempt from taxation of personal property within the limits of incorporated cities and towns.—S.

**CITY SCALES**—The purchase of a new set of city weighing scales has been proposed by the market committee to replace the old set which have been practically condemned by the inspectors. It is expected that a definite decision will be made at the next regular meeting of the City Council. The removal of the scales house from its present position beside the Public Library is a matter of moment, but the future site of the building is not known.

**FOR TOURIST SEASON**—In preparation for a busy tourist season and in order to give the Province the additional desired publicity the Tourist Bureau is issuing a new and enlarged folder depicting Island scenes and describing the advantages of the Province as a tourist resort, and a new map for motorists. There is also, in course of preparation, an illustrated pamphlet wherein is described various places of historical interest in the Province. A large number of inquiries from prospective tourists forecast a most successful season.

**CHARLOTTETOWN BOY MAKES GOOD**—Mr. Charles J. Monaghan, former Charlottetown boy, appointed assistant to the General Superintendent C. N. R. Hotels with headquarters at Winnipeg. A dispatch to the Montreal Gazette says: The resignation of A. W. Hodgson, resident manager of the Fort Garry Hotel, Winnipeg, was announced today by A. S. McLean, general superintendent of the hotel department, Canadian National Railways. C. L. Weldon, manager of the Macdonald Hotel at Edmonton, will become manager of the Fort Garry Hotel and Mr. Weldon will be succeeded by H. H. Tillman, the present manager of the Prince Arthur Hotel at Port Arthur. H. E. Perrott, assistant to the general superintendent of hotels, at Winnipeg, becomes resident manager of the Prince Arthur Hotel and he will be succeeded in his position in Winnipeg by Charles J. Monaghan, chief clerk of the hotel department at Montreal. Mr. Monaghan referred to above is a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Monaghan, 193 Weymouth St.

The shock of the daughter's death caused the death of her mother, Mrs. Burrows, who was a sister of the late Mr. A. Horne of this city, who left the Island about twenty years ago.

Secretary Jack Hillon also read a letter from Mr. Walter Pratt with reference to the opening function of the Canadian National Hotel. This event will be celebrated with a dance and supper, arrangements for which will be made with the help of the management. Details will be announced at a latter date.

**REPORT OF THE CHIEF SUPT. OF EDUCATION**

**BY PROFESSOR H. H. SHAW**

**DISTRICTS AND SCHOOLS**

The number of school districts in the Province during the year ending June 30, 1929, was 478. In five districts, Wilnot, Tryon West, Grand Pere Point, East Wilshire and Alberry Plains, the pupils were conveyed to neighbouring schools. In three other districts, Upper Belle Creek, Greenvale and Glenora, the schools were closed owing to scarcity of pupils, and Afton Road School was closed for want of a teacher.

The number of schools in operation during the school year was 472, and the number of school departments 618. The number of schools was increased by two and the departments by three over that of the preceding year.

**IMPERSONATOR CAPTIVATES LARGE AUDIENCE**

A most pleasing impression of a talented elocutionist, a skilful impersonator, and an accomplished dramatist in Miss Elsie McLuhan was given a large audience of lovers of classic at Hertz Memorial Hall last evening in a recital held under the auspices of the Y's Men's Club. Executing each number with effortless ease, painting vivid scenes in the minds of her hearers, and proving herself a complete master of her art Miss McLuhan demonstrated her capability of presenting equally well both tragic and comic scenes, stirring the hearts of the audience in the former and bringing spontaneous laughter in the latter.

In "How the La Roue Stakes Were Lost," the heroic action of little Willie Bill, the jockey held the audience in interest and admiration, as did also the following scene in Sheridan's "School for Scandal."

In what she terms her "Urges" or "Calls" Miss McLuhan revealed her best effort. The "Call of Memory" in an Italian impersonation "Rosa," and the "Call of the Mountains" in Robert Service's "The Spell of the Yukon" were delivered with a keen insight into human nature and human emotion.

How vanity and short-sightedness govern human choices, and how self-satisfied people can be with their own faults were humorously depicted in "The Exchange." The better side of human nature was equally well presented in "The Two Friends," a story of the true, tried, and self-sacrificing friendship of two old neighbours.

The delightfully amusing complications which may result from a child's prank, and an old maid's gossip when crepe is playfully tied on a door were portrayed in a quaint village scene. Equally as effective were sketches of scolding, lovable mother in the humorous readings "The Lady Who Lives Next Door," and "The Bath Hour." The crowning comedy of the evening was "An Account of a Negro Wedding" as described by a lady witness to the accompaniment of ludicrous blunders, although the scene "The Florist Shop," was extremely mirth-provoking.

A dramatic number, "The Cutting of B" from "The Taming of the Shrew," depicting a proposal scene was executed with full justice to Shakespearean comedy.

Assisting Miss McLuhan were Miss Lillian MacKenzie who played three piano solos, "Hungarian Rhapsody No. 6" by Liszt, "Lotus Land," by Cyril Scott, and "Japanese Study," by Fuldine, and Miss Margaret Sterns, who sang very acceptably three solos, "My Lovely Cella," "I Looked into your Garden," and "Le Cell."
