CONDUCTOR John Gillis of the Boston and Maine Railroad and formerly of Kensington was accidentally killed yesterday in Boston. There are no particulars. His sister Mrs. (Dr.) John E. McDonald of this town received the telegram to that effect yesterday afternoon and left on the evening train to break the news to his aged mother at Kensington. Deceased Mr. Gillis had been a conductor on the B. and M. Railway for eighteen years. He leaves a wife and three children living in Charlestown, Mass. Two brothers, Rodrick and Neil, also in the employ of the B. and M. Railway and one brother at home survive him.
