Cards Cling To First Place In National League

NEW YORK, July 2 (AP) — St. Louis Cardinals just managed to hold on to first place in the National League today by taking a 5-3 decision over New York Giants.

They made a runaway of the ball game for six innings, behind the lightning twirling of Handsome Harry Gumbert, ex-Giant, but Harry, after serving up one-hit ball for six frames, weaker down the stretch and the Giants had him practically changing on the ropes before he finally wound up with his fifth win of the year against four defeats.

Carl Hubbell was the New York starter -- and loser -- giving up four St. Louis runs before Van Mungo replaced him in the seventh. All told the Cards collected 11 hits, including Marty Marion's first home run of the year.

At Philadelphia, Truett (Rip) Sewell, whose slow ball keeps battering up by a serious countryman, the season against two defeats as Pittsburgh Pirates downed the Phillies, 2-1, before a ladies day crowd of 3,667 in Shibe Park.

TIMELY NOTES ON TOPICS CONNECTED WITH Silver Fox Farming

Last Monday we had the pleasure of a visit from Dr. E. Rendell Howess, nutritionist with Master Feeds, Inc., Toronto, and Regh Tinney of the P.E.I. Fur Pool, Ltd. and enjoyed an hour's conversation on fox topics with these two well informed men.

Here the rancher would be well advised to keep abreast of this angle to the best of his ability, but bearing adverse government regulations we believe the fur ranchers can look forward to a very successful year.

And now we have the pleasure of introducing a very timely article by Dr. C. K. Gunn, Dominion Experimental Fox Ranch, Summerside. Read it carefully and practice the advice given. It may save you or us many, many dollars.

Now that the hot weather has arrived, it is very advisable that we fox ranchers pay particular attention to our fox feeds. Bacteriological examinations of carcasses from ranches which have recently had sickness and deaths among their fox pups, show a high incidence of food poisoning in these ranches.

Any sick cats or dogs on the fox ranch should be removed to other quarters where there is no chance of contact with the foxes nor their feed.

At this season of the year, fox pups are growing rapidly and there is a great demand for mineral salts, especially calcium and phosphorus. These are present in bone meal, whole milk or buttermilk are also good sources of calcium.

Because of the excessive dampness this season, cereal feed should also be checked to make sure that it is dry and not moldy. If it smells sour, do not feed it. Also do not mix it with the meats and allow the mixture to stand in a warm place several hours before giving it to the foxes.

Where fox pups are housed in pens that allow them to run out doors, it is advisable to see that they do not get exposed to a cold rain storm. This lowers the resistance of weak and undernourished pups and they may succumb to pneumonia as a result of the wetting.

Make sure your fox pups are free from earmites, fleas and parasitic intestinal worms. When you find earmites or fleas on the foxes don't forget to clean and spritz the whole pen when you have treated the animals.

When we have attended to the fox parasites, the refrigeration, sanitation and the housing of pups, then we should make sure that our fox pups are getting all they can nicely eat of a well balanced diet in order to get maximum growth in these young animals.

G.C.F. Opposition In By-Elections

OTTAWA, July 2 (CP) — Liberal candidates will be opposed in at least three of the four constituencies in which Federal by-elections are fixed for Aug. 9, despite the announcement last night by John Bracken, National Progressive Conservative Leader, that his party headquarters would take no steps to put candidates in the field.

C.C.F. already has selected candidates in the Manitoba constituency of Selkirk, in the Saskatchewan constituency of Humboldt and in Montreal Carier.

Today, Angus MacInnis (C.C.F., Vancouver East), acting leader of the C.C.F. in the absence of M. J. Coldwell, told The Canadian Press he was not sure whether there would be a C.C.F. candidate in Stantand (Que.) the fourth constituency in which voting is scheduled.

The four constituencies were previously Liberal seats and all will be contested by Liberal candidates. In addition to the C.C.F. candidates, there may be Independents or representatives of one or more of the French-Canadian parties in the field.

Our general advice to the fur farmer is to keep as large a number of pelts as he can take care of with the assistance of his family and friends, even though cost of production may be somewhat higher than in previous years, because at the moment it looks as though ranches furs would continue to enjoy great popularity at or near present levels, especially in view of the undoubted fact that the catch of wild furs due to man power conditions created by the war will steadily decline.

The production of ranches furs this year was probably normal, whereas the catch of wild furs was about half of 1941-42, and if the present trend continues we will have a still smaller catch of wild furs to work on next season. The only serious question which we cannot answer at the moment is possible government restrictions.
