### MOBILIZATION LAW PROVOKES RIOT IN DIET

Riotous Debate Over War Control Measure Forces Parliament Into Recess.

### Declares Country Will Remain Free And Independent

Patriotic Outburst Accompanies Declaration Of Von Schuschnigg.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Feb. 24—Germany was reported tonight to have accepted Italy in acceptance of Great Britain's plans for the withdrawal of foreign troops from Spain.

A committee report recommending a change in the curriculum of the public schools of this province was adopted by the Dairymen's Association of Prince Edward Island last night.
