Tenders for Lease of City Fish Market
The following tenders for lease of the Fish Market were submitted to the City Council and discussed at the last monthly meeting. From James Roberts, 206 Sidney Street, City: \$1200.00 per day for Fish Market from April 30th, 1944 to April 30th, 1945. (No need of food cut). Firm Robert Ford and Sons, Brantley Beach, P.E.I.: \$600.00 for one year or \$6000.00 a year for term of five years, \$700.00 a year if City will cut in door. Willing to give two men rights to stalls on Tuesdays and Fridays. From Roop's Limited, City: \$500. a year for term of five years from May 1st, 1944 with option of renewal of lease upon written notice by them, thirty days before May 1st, 1945, said renewal to be for further period of five years. Agree to make three stalls available to dealers who had formerly occupied them, such dealers to pay Roop's \$100.00 per month for use of stalls. Three Days Lopped Off Mail Delivery in Mediterranean

OTTAWA, April 11 (CP)—The post office department disclosed today that three days have been lopped off the transit time for delivery of surface mail from Canada to Canadian troops in the Mediterranean area. When Postmaster General Mulock outlined the details of the new time-of-flight program in the House of Commons Feb. 28, he set 59 days as the time required for receipt of letters by Canadians on the Italian front. Since then the average time has been cut to 56 days, with prospects that the time will be further improved. The Department said today that of 21,250,000 pounds of mail for the troops over the last 12 months 187,000 pounds, or .88 per cent, had been lost from all causes, including enemy activities.
