MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, the fourth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen years, at two o'clock in the afternoon, and was constituted with prayer. There were present Messrs. A. J. McNeill, Moderator, W. H. Spencer, A. Craise, John Gillis, John Stirling, D. B. McLeod, R. P. Murray, Robert Murray, J. W. McKenzie, A. McKay, G. C. Taylor, J. M. McLeod, ministers; T. C. James, Norman McSwain, R. Munn, James Simpson, David Schurman and J. J. McLeod, elders. Minutes of meetings held on November the fifth, and the twenty-sixth December, the tenth, the twenty-third and the twenty-fourth, one thousand nine hundred and twelve; January the seventh, and February the sixth, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, being in the hands of members in printed form, were held as read and sustained. The Rev. James C. Martin, Abbotsford, Wisconsin, U. S. A., being present was invited to sit and correspond.

The Moderator in appropriate terms called the attention of the court to the death of John Hawley. Other members having spoken Messrs. J. M. McLeod, R. P. Murray and T. C. James were appointed to prepare a suitable obituary notice for the Presbytery Record. John Stirling was elected Moderator for the next six months, and A. Craise was re-elected clerk for the ensuing year. The clerk read an intimation from the Presbytery of Ottawa in regard to an application on behalf of a minister of another denomination for reception into the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and to be considered by the General Assembly. The clerk stated that M. N. McLeod Moderator in a call at Cardigan on the twenty-fourth day of February last, that the call came out unanimously in favor of James C. Martin of the First Presbyterian Church, Abbotsford, Wisconsin, U. S. A., that the call was signed by one hundred and one hundred and fifty-nine (159) adherents, and that it was accompanied with a guarantee of nine hundred dollars (\$900.00) stipend with use of manse and glebe and a yearly vacation of one month. On motion the action of the interim Moderator was approved. Messrs. A. Martin and A. McLeod having spoken in support of the call, Presbytery sustained the call and instructed the clerk to forward the same to the clerk of the Presbytery of Winnipeg. Messrs. C. F. Gieger, Athens, Wis., and M. R. Laird, Marshfield, Wis., were appointed to prosecute the call before the Presbytery of Winnipeg. Provisional arrangements were made for the induction of Mr. Martin at Cardigan—day and hour to be fixed by the interim Moderator and clerk—as follows: Mr. M. N. McLeod to preside and induct; Mr. J. M. McLeod to preach; Mr. D. Wright to officiate.

address the minister and Mr. A. J. W. Back the people. Serving of the saint was left in the hands of the interim Moderator. Mr. Robert Murray moved the following motion, of which he had given due notice:—That this Presbytery overture the General Assembly to divide this Presbytery and form the western congregation from and including Brookfield, into a separate Presbytery. This was seconded by Mr. John Gillis. Mr. G. A. Sutherland moved in amendment, that this question be delayed in the meantime, and that a committee be appointed to consider the payment of the travelling expenses of members attending the meetings of Presbytery. This was seconded by Mr. J. W. McKenzie. On a vote being taken the majority voted for the amendment and it became the finding of the court. The following were appointed to act on this committee, namely: Messrs. A. Sutherland, convener; T. F. Fullerton, George Millar, A. J. W. Back and T. C. James. Mr. G. A. Sutherland moved the following motion, of which he had given notice:—That this Presbytery appoint a standing committee for the oversight of students studying for the ministry. This was seconded by Mr. John Gillis and carried. Messrs. W. H. Spencer, A. D. McIntosh, A. J. W. Back and D. Schurman were appointed to nominate a standing committee. Mr. T. C. James presented the following resolution, which was carried:—In removing the name of Mr. John Hawley from the roll the Presbytery desire to place on record their high appreciation of his personal character, and of his zeal and diligence in the ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ. His tender and loving disposition endeared him to all with whom he came in contact, and his earnest and faithful presentation of the truths of the Gospel made his pulpit ministrations most helpful, not only in his own congregation, but throughout the whole Presbytery. They earnestly commend the bereaved widow and family to the tender love of the Great Head of the Church, and pray that they may be sustained and comforted in the hour of their affliction. To the congregation who so long enjoyed the faithful ministry of our late brother, the Presbytery extend their sympathy, with the earnest hope that the Chief Shepherd may speedily send them a shepherd after His own heart, who shall lead them into "the green pastures and by the still waters" of the word and ordinances.

The Clerk was instructed to forward copies of this resolution to Mrs. Hawley and Marshfield congregation. On the invitation of the Moderator Mr. T. C. James offered prayer on behalf of the bereaved widow and family, and Marshfield congregation. Mr. J. J. McLeod reported that the people at Tryon, Hampton and Bonshaw were moving in a call to a minister, and that as soon as moderation had taken place the call would be laid before Presbytery. Mr. Geo. Millar was appointed interim moderator of Montrose session. Mr. R. P. Murray was appointed interim moderator of Marshfield session and instructed to have the charge declared vacant as soon as possible. The Rev. Dr. Murdoch McKenzie was nominated Moderator of the General Assembly which meets at Toronto in June next. The following were elected commissioners to the General Assembly, by rotation, Messrs. John Stirling, D. B. McLeod; by election, J. W. McKenzie, Robert Murray, T. F. Fullerton, ministers; R. Munn, James Simpson, M. McInnis, T. C. James and D. Schurman, elders, with W. M. Murchison as alternate. In the event of commissioners being unable to attend the Assembly the clerk was authorized to appoint substitutes. The matter of making allocations to congregations for the Synod Fund was left in the hands of Presbytery's committee on Systematic Giving, and to report at next meeting. On motion, it was decided to apply to the Home Mission Board for a catechist to labor at Inverness during the coming summer.

ing the coming summer. The clerk was instructed to certify Mr. Neil Rattae to the Home Mission Board for work in the mission field. It was decided, on motion, to apply for grants from the augmentation fund on behalf of the following congregations:— Murray Harbor North, one hundred dollars (\$100.00); Wood Islands, two hundred dollars (\$200.00); West River, three hundred dollars (\$300.00); Dundas, one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Mr. W. H. Spencer resigned the convener'ship of the central committee on budget allocations, and Mr. G. C. Taylor was appointed in his place. Mr. A. J. McNeill moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Mr. John Gillis:—Whereas by the report of the General Assembly of 1912 it appears that but a minority of the ministers in the church are connected with the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund; and, Whereas the said fund derives its revenue from the following sources: 1. Contributions from congregations. 2. Donations and bequests. 3. Grants from the proceeds of the sale of the Book of Praise. 4. Rates paid by ministers; and, Whereas the first three sources mentioned, constituting the greater part of the annual revenue, should benefit equally all the ministers of the church; Therefore, this Presbytery respectfully overtures the General Assembly to amend the rules governing this fund, that all retired, aged and infirm ministers shall partake equally according to years of service in the part of the fund derived from the first three sources above mentioned, and that those paying rates receive the additional amount to which they are entitled, because of the fact that they are paying the rates; that the Assembly take steps to increase the endowment of this fund, and that a larger amount be allocated to it in the Budget, in order that it may be placed on a more satisfactory financial basis; and that should the Assembly grant the prayer of this overture it shall come into effect when the fund is in such a condition that those now entitled to benefit from it

will not receive less than the amount to which they are at present entitled. After consideration it was moved by Mr. G. A. Sutherland, seconded by Mr. T. C. James, and carried, that this overture be laid on the table in the meantime. Mr. A. Craise reported on his work at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, which report was received and adopted and ordered to be transmitted to the secretary of the Home Mission Board. A communication in regard to the proposed Robert Murray Memorial was read. It was decided, on motion, that the proposal be approved, and that further consideration of the matter be postponed until next meeting. Messrs. E. J. Rattae and T. F. Fullerton were nominated to act on the General Assembly's Home Mission committee. Mr. G. C. Taylor intimated that public worship would be conducted for the first time in the new Zion Church, Charlottetown, on Sabbath, the eleventh day of May next, and asked the Presbytery to arrange for the dedication service on the Tuesday following, that being the date of the next quarterly meeting of Presbytery. Messrs. John Stirling, Moderator, Convener, T. F. Fullerton, G. C. Taylor, D. Schurman, and T. C. James were appointed to arrange for the service.
