THERE was a larger market yesterday, both in attendance and quantity of produce than there has been for some weeks past. Eggs were quite plentiful and decreased in price to 23 1/2 cts. per doz. Butter per lb. sold at 24 1/2 cts. There was a slight advance in pork which sold from 6-6 1/2 cts. The price of hay remains at 80 cts. per cwt.

Three sons with the daughter live in Massachusetts, one son in the West, and one on the old homestead. Mr. Burhoe was for many years a member of the Methodist church and for a long time had taken an active part in the little church of that name at Baman's, Murray Harbor Road. He was loved and respected by those who knew him best, and because of his love for and faith in Christ all believe he sleeps in Jesus. He leaves his family a good example, living sober and in the fear of the Lord; and it may be said of him in the community where he lived, that a good man has fallen.—Com.
