VILLAINOUS ATTEMPT

The Action of a Highwayman Foiled.

MR. HALL'S COURAGE

Intimidates the Bandit and the Plot of The Hour is Unsuccessful.

Living in a land where little occurs to cause a sensation one naturally re-alls the tragedies and occurrences of other lands. Mr. L. C. Hall, proprietor of the Hotel Acadia miraculously escaped highway robbery and bodily injury on Friday night by his great courage and presence of mind. The plot was exceedingly well worked and showed that the culprit was a professional. The following is Mr. Hall's narrative of the affair:

At 12 o'clock Friday a man who gave his name as Sullivan called me up at the Acadia stating that he and his wife were staying at the Queen Hotel, and that a man arrived that day from Boston who was very sick, and wished to be taken out to the Acadia, as he was very anxious to see me. He further remarked that the sick man had sent for an Attorney who had given him (Sullivan) \$10 to hire a team and bring me in at once. I got in with him and after driving part of the way he said that the axle of the wagon was heated and would have to be greased before he could drive any further. After crossing Wright's Bridge and going up the hill beyond, he stopped the horse and jumped from the wagon to go to the nearest house, as he said, to get some axle grease. We were then alongside of the thick woods that runs along in front of O. Mason's and Donse's. Mason's house was about three hundred yards from the road behind the woods, but there was no other residence nearer than Mr. Fred Vessey's, about three-quarters of a mile away. After waiting some time I heard some one shout in the woods that his coat was caught in the bushes and that he wanted me to go and release him. As my suspicions were now aroused I started the horse towards the city. He was a fine bay horse and possessed considerable speed. The night was bright and though I looked back through the window of the buggy I could see no one following. After driving half a mile I stopped the horse and when I did so Sullivan jumped down from the back of the wagon, where he had evidently been standing all the time. When he alighted he demanded with oaths why I ran away from him. I told him he was a fraud, and that he would get himself into trouble. He was apparently somewhat frightened. When he got down from the wagon he seized the horse by the bridle, and when I jumped out he turned the team around, saying that he must go back and find his glasses, which he had lost in the woods. When he had gone a few hundred yards he called out that if I would pay him twenty dollars he would take me back to the hotel. I respectfully declined the offer, and started towards the city, and walked as far as Mr. McLeod's on the Brackley Point Road about three-quarters of a mile further on. I stopped there till morning when Mr. McLeod drove me to the city. When Sullivan had arrived at the Acadia he told the boys that he had hired his rig at the Central Livery Stable in this city, but to me he stated that he got it from a man named Wood. The fellow was a short, well dressed man between 25 and 30, and evidently an American. He seemed well acquainted with Boston but was beyond doubt a stranger in this province. In his conversation with me he said that he came out by way of St. Peter's Road. On leaving the hotel he had asked if I had money to pay expenses, and if not he would lend me some. He also asked the time, and seemed to pay close attention to my watch, when I consulted it. I fully believe that the man contemplated robbery, as all his actions seemed to point that way.

DURING the lightning storm of Friday night Mr. Gallant of Bloomfield lost a beautiful horse. The animal was struck by lightning and instantly killed.
