### Spain's Policy Clearly Defended

FOLTZ (Associated Press Staff Writer) MADRID, Aug. 22 — (AP) — Spain's present policy was clearly defined today in an article in the weekly El Espanol which established these two points: 1. Spain is out of the war because the Government, "despite movements of sympathy or compassion in certain sections of the population," kept Spain a non-belligerent "by its own free decision." The inference was that Spain will stay out of the war. 2. Spain's Falangist Party regime is a national regime and therefore above international events and not to be influenced by the fall of Fascism in Italy or other foreign developments. (This explanation of Spanish policy follows a two-hour interview by Sir Samuel Hoare, British Ambassador, with Gen. Francisco Franco and his Foreign Minister, Count Francisco Gomez Jordana, Friday night. (No statement on the meeting was issued, but it was assumed that questions relating to Spain's neutrality, the status of her "blue division" fighting for Germany on the Russian front, the situation in the Spanish-occupied zone of Tangier in Morocco and other problems were reviewed. (London dispatches Saturday quoted the Evening News as declaring "one thing we shall demand of him (Franco) is that Spain shall at least exhibit complete and careful neutrality from now on and not harbor any Axis war criminals. And we shall be in a position at last to make these demands.") El Espanol, like the Falangist Party organ, Arriba, frequently publishes articles of national importance. At the same time a second development which seemed to delineate Spain's attitude was a unique official pilgrimage of thousands of Falangists to Santiago de Compostela where Franco and high party leaders joined them. This pilgrimage was designed to show the Catholic character of the party and one of the points officially cited as making the Spanish party different from all others such as Fascist or Nazi.

There was only a small exhibit in the Market Lamb Class, Lamb Division, and the prizes offered went to Almond Boswell of Dunstaffnage. Both hogs and lambs were sold on competitive tender and were purchased by the Swift Canadian Company of Moncton, New Brunswick through the Livestock Marketing Board. Their bid on hogs was 20c per lb., carcass weight, plus \$1.50 per head premium on Selects, and on Lambs 33c per lb., carcass weight rail grade.

The Firestone Dealer will gladly allow you to consult the Rubber Controller's Order No. 4 of June 30, 1943, which defines exactly who are eligible buyers:

**CLASS A**  
Eligible for new, retreaded or used tires and retreading service; also for used or used tubes:

- Doctors
- Visiting Nurses
- Veterinarians
- Ministers, Priests, Rabbis (serving 2 or more parishes 1 or more miles apart)
- Ambulance
- Police
- Fire fighter equipment
- Express and mail service
- Delivery of newspapers (wholesale)
- Prospectors
- Public utilities

**CLASS B**  
Eligible for used or retreaded tires and retreading service; also for used or used tubes:

- War workers
- Vehicle registered under Wartime Industrial Control Plan
- Vehicle used to carry mail
- Domestic and Provincial level officials
- Judges, magistrates, crown attorneys, sheriffs, etc.
- Highway engineers
- Construction superintendents
- Inspectors for fire, accident, grain elevators or boilers
- Red Cross employees (full time)
- Employees of Dom. or Prov. Dept. Agriculture or Forest Assn.
- Employees of essential services of essential goods and chicken hatcheries

**CLASS C**  
Eligible for used tires and tubes and retreading service:

- Commercial travellers
- Bond or life insurance salesmen
- Insurance adjusters
- Finance company collectors
- Chain-store supervisors
- Farm implements or horse-drawn vehicles
- Passenger cars owned by a farmer who also has a truck
- Rural auctioneers
- Buyers of livestock and perishable food commodities
- Dentists and optometrists who attend the armed forces or who operate branches
- Press reporters and combat photographers
- Regional supervisors of Aircraft Detection Corps, Reserve Army or A.P.C.
- Rural school teachers
- Exterminators
- Motorcycles owned by flying schools
- Cars and trailers owned by farmers or persons engaged in fishing, maintaining or repairing buildings and essential commercial machines
- Hotels
- Ministers, Priests, Rabbis
- Dentists and Christian Science Practitioners
- Rural undertakers
- Incapacitated individuals and surveyors
- Tourists (emergency)
- Members of the Diplomatic Corps, High Commissioners, Consuls, etc.

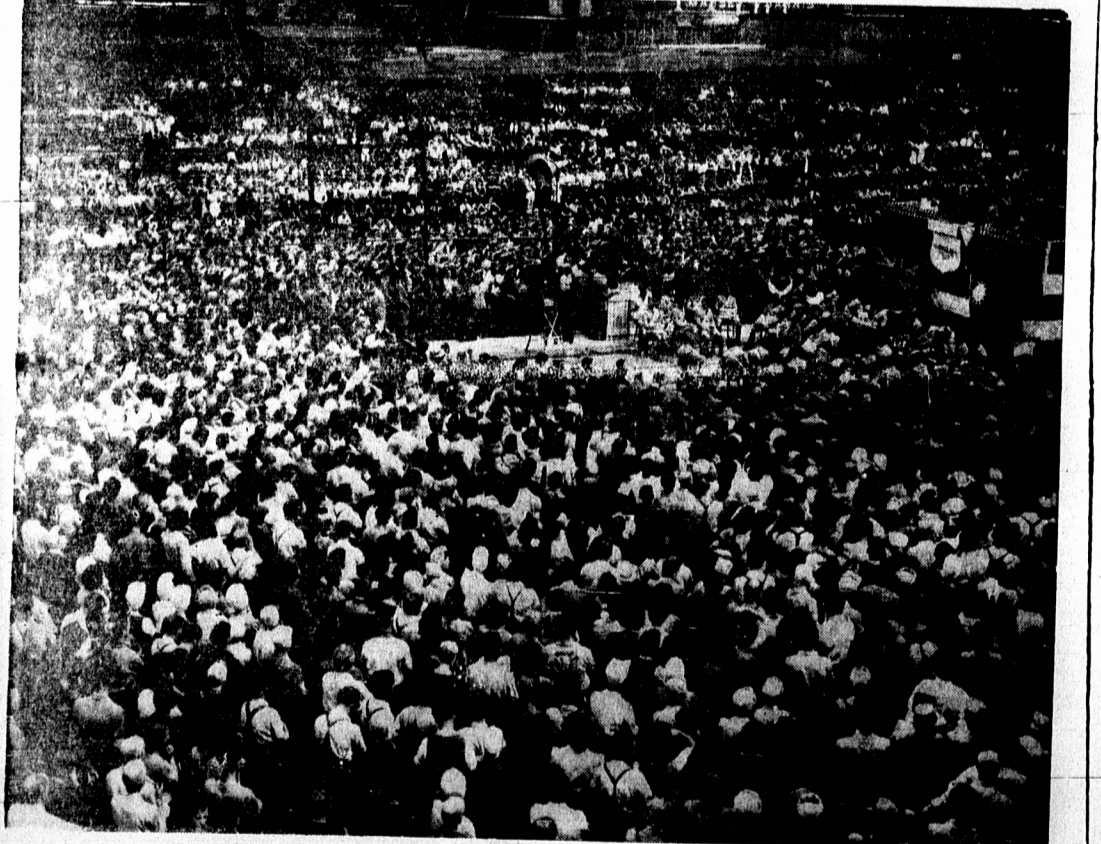

100,000TH CANADIAN BREN DESPATCHED TO CHINA FIGHTING FRONT—Canada's 100,000th Bren gun was started on its way to a Chinese unit on the fighting fronts of the Far East, Friday, when G. K. Shells, Deputy Minister of Munitions and Supply, presented the weapon to Dr. Liu Shih-shun, Chinese Minister to Canada. More than 10,000 workers of the John Inglis Co., Ltd., Toronto, almost half of them women, cheered as their representative, Miss Kay Dryborough, handed the Bren to Mr. Shells. Major-General Chu Shih-min, Military Attache of the Chinese Embassy in Washington, announced the gun would be despatched to China immediately as a symbol of a great flood of Canadian munitions to be sent to China under Canada's mutual aid plan. More than one-third of the Inglis Company's output of 8,000 Brens monthly have been earmarked for China, and the firm has large orders for other small arms for the Chinese. Production of Brens began in the huge Toronto plant in March, 1940. The company also has made 50,000 Boys anti-tank rifles, 33,000 Browning aircraft machine guns, thousands of other weapons.
