For The Cook

CASSIN PUDDING One quart whole milk, 3 eggs, 3 tablespoons corn starch, pinch salt, vanilla. Heat the milk in a double boiler. Mix together the egg-yolks, cornstarch, salt and enough of the milk (cold) to make the liquid thin. When milk is hot, pour this into it, and cook over hot water until thick. Beat up egg-whites, and fold in at the last. Then add vanilla. In a greased baking dish sprinkle 1/2 cup of light brown sugar, then pour in the custard. Sprinkle another 1/2 cup brown sugar on top of custard, and put in a fairly hot oven for about 10 minutes. Serve cold.

BLOTCHY SKIN

A much-worried reader writes: "As you say, Miss Leeds, the winter social season is here and we are all particularly anxious to look our best. But I happen to be one of those unfortunate women who really looks her worst when she should be at her best. No matter how carefully I groom myself for a party my face is almost sure to break out in ugly red spots before the affair is over. This is particularly true if I dance but also troubles me at other times. Do you think this is caused by cold weather? And is there anything in the world I can do to remedy it, because it certainly makes me unhappy and very self-conscious."

This is only one of the many letters complaining of the same annoying condition. Yes, the cold weather has something to do with it, as the skin is usually more sensitive after being exposed to the cold. However that is only an indirect cause and those with complexions of this type are never sure of being free from red spots and blotches at any time of the year. In the first place, any one with this affliction must pay more than usual attention to diet. It would be wise to eat no desserts or rich food of any kind; instead of the usual dessert take some raw fruit, such as an apple, orange or grapefruit. Drink a great deal of water between meals - four to six glasses, if possible, and occasionally add the juice of a lemon to the water; do not sweeten this, however. For those who wish to drink with their meals also I would advise milk rather than tea or coffee. Be sure that the meals contain a plentiful supply of such vegetables as greens, cabbage, tomatoes and carrots. Eat at least two of these raw every day.

Poor circulation as well as unwise diet is often an underlying cause of a blotchy complexion. Daily exercise will improve the circulation and a cold bath or a brisk rub with a coarse towel every morning will also tone it up. In addition to the building up of one's general health through diet and exercise, the skin itself needs espe-

cial care. Ointments containing boric acid are very beneficial to a blotchy complexion. After cleansing the face at bedtime rinse in cold water, to which a few drops of spirits of camphor have been added. Dry and apply the following lotion, which should be left on overnight: precipitated sulphur, one ounce; camphorated alcohol, one ounce; rosewater eight ounces. Shake well. Finally, try not to worry too much about a blotchy skin. Nervousness and worry always accentuate the condition and that may be one of the reasons why most of my readers say that they find their complexions more blotchy at parties and times when they should be at their best than otherwise. Furthermore, such worry detracts greatly from one's poise and self-confidence and lack of these is a greater enemy to true beauty and charm than a complexion which has a tendency to redden.
