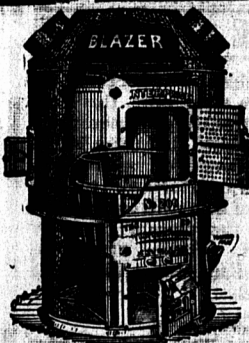

IDENTIFIED. BOSTON, Sept. 12.—Mrs. A. E. Slayton, Commercial street, North Sydney, arrived in Boston today and identified the young woman who was murdered at the Peble house, in the west end, as her sister, Mabel Slayton, of North Sydney. Miss Slayton and Frank Ogilvie, the Melrose, Mass., sailor, who killed her, both died at the relief station, a branch of the Boston city hospital, at Market square, where they were rushed in an ambulance following the dual shooting. The Sydney girl died at 2.40 a. m. yesterday and her lover at 8.20 the same morning. It is the opinion of the police and medical authorities that the tragedy was caused by jealousy. A well-known Melrose girl, to whom Ogilvie was engaged, is supposed to be behind the murder and suicide. Mrs. Clara Ogilvie, mother of the assassin, was with her son when he died. Miss Slayton died before her sister in Sydney had heard of the shooting. Ogilvie is said to have been half-drunken, he had been moody for weeks and had threatened to kill Charlie Slayton, his Melrose employer. He was saving his money to buy out his employer. Before being in the ice business he was a sailor and had been in the provinces. It is thought the body of Miss Slayton, which is now at the city morgue, will be sent to Sydney.
