Latest News of the City and Province.

It is understood that the new time table of the P. E. I. Railway will come into effect upon October 15th. The express train connecting with the steamer at Summerside will leave earlier than at present.

The big Squash in the window of Carter's bookstore is attracting much attention. It was grown by Mr. Jas. Houston of this city, and is the largest squash ever raised in P. E. Island. The weight is 190 lbs. Fancy a squash almost as heavy as a barrel of flour.

At the Police Court Saturday morning Robert Davis for being drunk, was fined \$2 or ten days. The case against John Gorman, who was arrested on a charge of using profane language on the street was adjourned in order that the defendant could bring witnesses to prove that he was not guilty.

TRAFFIC on the Prince Edward Island Railway has been large for some time past and during Exhibition week an extraordinary passenger traffic was handled in good shape. Wednesday and Thursday's incoming regular and special trains were crowded. On Thursday evening six trains left Charlottetown between the hours of 3 and 5.30 p. m. The following morning the express train to connect with the steamer at Summerside had to be run in two sections, and trains had to be run continually to accommodate the large crowds. It is estimated that 3000 people were transferred by the railway in two days. Supt. Sharpe and his efficient staff deserve great credit for the way the increased traffic was handled.

M. D. J. McDONALD was ordained at Presbyterian clergyman and inducted pastor of the Presbyterian churches on this field Tuesday evening in this town. The visiting clergymen present were Rev. Mr. Henry, Moderator of the Presbyterian Synod of the Maritime Provinces, Rev. Mr. Miller, of Yarmouth, Rev. Mr. Crawford, Bridgewater, and Mr. Cunningham, catechist, of Lockeport. Rev. MR. TALBOT who gave the glass blowing exhibition at the Exhibition Grounds last week, leaves to-morrow, for Souris, to give an exhibition there. He will also visit Summerside. Mr. Talbot and Mrs. Talbot gave exhibitions at the World's Fair, and Mrs. Talbot secured the gold medal presented by the Commissioner. In fact she was the only Canadian lady securing a medal for glass blowing.

The British election have opened very auspiciously for the Salisbury Government in the unopposed return of 51 ministerial supporters on nomination day. The fact that Mr. Chamberlain is among the number returned by acclamation is also a fact of some significance. There are still over 600 seats to be contested at the polls, and the result there must determine the fate of parties, but there can be little doubt that the Government will be strongly endorsed by the majority.

THE McDonald Manual Training Department is now ready for classes to begin work. The Board of School Trustees under whose direction it will be conducted will meet at 4 o'clock, this afternoon in the Department on the upper flat of Queen Square School and declare it open.
