An interesting series of experiments are being carried on at the Sheffield Scientific School in the way of studying the amount of food necessary to sustain human life and strength under ordinary conditions. The experiments are not designed to establish any given theory, and are yet incomplete, but so far as they have gone they confirm the impression that people ordinarily consume much more food than is necessary, and that this excess is all ways in the long run detrimental to health.

The Conservative Convention at Georgetown yesterday with great apparent unanimity nominated John McLean, merchant of Souris, as their standard bearer in the coming Dominion election. Mr. McLean has since 1888 represented the First District of Kings in the provincial Legislature, and is a strong and popular man in that District with very large business interests in the county. At the last provincial election his majority of 392 was more than the total vote polled by his opponent. The First District is, however, more strongly Conservative than some other Districts of Kings County. Mr. McLean's acceptance of the nomination for the Commons will when the election comes round vacate his seat in the Legislature. We presume that Mr. McLean will poll the full strength of his party in Kings as Mr. Hughes the sitting member may be expected to be supported by the Liberals of that constituency. It remains to be seen which party is the stronger in Kings.

CONVENTION AT GEORGETOWN

The Liberal Conservative Convention held yesterday at Georgetown was very largely attended and most harmonious.

The chair was occupied by the President of the King's County Association, Hon. Daniel Gordon and John A. Stewart, New Perth was Secretary. The President in opening the convention referred to the coming election and the prospect of a Conservative victory shown by the very large number of delegates who were present.

Austin McDonald Montague moved seconded by J. G. Sterns, "Soutis a resolution pledging on record the convention's approval of Dr. J. R. L. Borde in whom was a leader fit to take rank with the greatest of his great predecessors. This resolution was carried unanimously.

Austin McDonald, Montague, spoke of his long years of political service. He had entered local politics thirty two years ago as member for Cardigan district and referred to his varied career, sometimes successful, sometimes with defeat. In that time he had always received a handsome support and had in thirty years represented the country in twenty one sessions of parliament. He had looked forward to running in the coming election and in conversation with Mr. McLean the latter had agreed with him. After consultation with his friends however he had decided otherwise, thinking the matter over he had decided to step out and make way for a younger man.

He moved therefore that John McLean be the candidate of the convention. The motion was seconded by Mr. Gallant and carried amid prolonged and enthusiastic applause and cheers for Mr. McDonald whose action in retiring had won for him the hearty sympathy of the convention.

Three cheers were then given for Mr. McLean who was received with great applause. He referred to the past elections he had run with Mr. McDonald and considered the latter was still entitled to the nomination if he stood on his rights. After referring to the great prospect of victory he accepted the nomination and heartily thanked the delegates.

Before the convention closed Hon. Mr. Gordon tendered his resignation as President of the King's County Liberal Conservative Association and Austin McDonald was chosen in his stead.
