Russia Again Takes Issue In Arms Dispute
 BY MAX HARRISON
 LANE SUCCESS, N. Y., Feb. 4
 (AP)—Soviet Russia took issue
 today with a United States de-
 claration that world-wide arms re-
 duction must await the "realization
 of outright safeguards to prevent
 violation or evasion of arms agree-
 ments."
 Soviet delegate Andrei A. Gromy-
 ko told the United Nations Security
 Council that Warren E. Austin,
 United States delegate, was "illog-
 ical" in insisting that an interna-
 tional system of security must be
 the first step toward disarmament.
 Gromyko said disarmament itself
 should be the initial move in the
 broader program or world security.
 At the same time, the Soviet de-
 legate rejected a new American re-
 duction on the arms reduction
 question as "unnecessary." Gromy-
 ko said.

CANADA PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND
 WHEREAS by Proclamation of the
 Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council
 of the Province of Prince Ed-
 ward Island issued on the 30th
 day of January, A.D. 1947, under
 powers conferred in Section 2
 (b) of "The Public Utilities Act"
 importers, distributors, retailers
 and owners of coal and coke were
 declared to be a "Public Utility"
 within meaning of the said Act.
 AND WHEREAS by reason of
 the impending or deferred strike
 in the coal mines of Nova Scotia
 a scarcity of fuel is now immin-
 ent.
 THEREFORE in order to avoid,
 if possible, unnecessary hardship
 due to lack of fuel, the Board as
 a preliminary directive doth or-
 der that all distributors and deal-
 ers in coal and coke within this
 Province shall, commencing forth-
 with, conserve their supplies of
 coal and coke by all reasonable
 means. That in the distribution
 of these fuels priority shall be
 given to the needs of hospitals,
 private homes and residential in-
 stitutions. In determining the
 need for fuel no person or insti-
 tution shall be deemed to be in
 need who or which possesses suf-
 ficient fuel to last for a period
 exceeding five full days.
 BEFORE delivering coal or coke
 to any house the dealer should
 satisfy himself as to the actual
 need, and in no case shall more
 than one load, not exceeding one
 ton, be delivered to any person
 or household.
