### WILLIAM

A Great Programme In His Honor.

STAYING AT WINDSOR

And Sandringham — Will Shoot in Scotland—Friendly Results Expected.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—(Special)—An elaborate programme has been prepared for Emperor William's visit on the 20th.

The Emperor and his suite on board the royal yacht will be met at Portsmouth by the British special service squadron and then the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York will receive the distinguished visitor.

WILL VISIT HIS GRANDMA AND UNCLE.

The party will go direct to meet the General at Windsor remaining five days.

The Emperor will then go to Sandringham the home of Prince of Wales where he will meet Salisbury, Balfour, Rosebery, Caambrlain, Wolsey and others.

The remainder of the visit will be spent at Chatford and shooting in Scotland.

IMPORTANT RESULTS EXPECTED.

## THE WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA

### Saturday Night's and Sunday's Despatches.

## THREE SIEGES ARE GOING ON

At Ladysmith, Kimberly and Mafeking—But All Are Holding Out—Troops Sent to Durban—Buller Will Relieve Ladysmith—British Column Advancing Toward Kimberly Encounters The Enemy at Orange River—Basutos Remain Loyal

### QUEEN'S FAREWELL TO THE GUARDS.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—(Special)—Amid scenes of the greatest enthusiasm the Queen reviewed the Royal Horse Guards, the First Life Guards and the Second Rifle Guards, and farewelled them for South Africa.

### THE LAST TO SAIL.

The last infantry battalions under orders for South Africa sailed today, also the first battery of the howitzer artillery.

### BOMBARDMENT OF KIMBERLY, etc.

A reconnoissance in force had a skirmish with the Boers near Belmont.

The bombardment of Kimberly began on Tuesday last.

A large force of men and guns from the Terrible has been sent to the front from Durban.

### TROOPS SENT TO DURBAN.

The steamers Yorkshire, Sinsmore Castle and Aurania have arrived and the first two were sent to Durban with their troops.

### BOMBARDMENT EXPECTED.

There is still no news from Ladysmith, but the Boers are known to be collecting in force between Colenso and Ladysmith and the bombardment is expected to begin any day.

### SOME BAD NEWS NOT CREDITED.

A report from Brest, France, says a British transport has foundered off the island of Ushant in Brittany.

The news is not credited in London.

### LIEUT. WOOD SERIOUSLY HURT.

HALIFAX, Nov. 11.—[Special].—News has been received that Lieut. C. C. Wood of the North Lancashire Regiment, son of Capt. J. Taylor Wood,

was seriously wounded at Belcourt on Friday.

### COL. DOMVILLE'S CAVALRY.

OTTAWA, Nov. 11.—(Special)—The Government has a message from Chamberlain thanking Col. Domville for his offer of a Cavalry Regiment but declining the offer.

### A GENEROUS CANADIAN.

One enthusiastic Canadian has cabled \$100 for standing room for himself in the pit at Charles Wyndham's opening performance in the New Theatre, Nov. 16 when the money goes to the Soldiers' Fund.

### ROYAL COURTNEY TO LADY SYMONDS.

The Queen will offer Lady Symonds the first vacant suite of rooms in Hampton Court.

### THE PRINCE'S PATRONAGE.

The Prince of Wales' patronage of Mrs. Brown Potter's entertainment for his funds for the hospital ship Maine in South African Waters has secured its success.

### LATEST—SUNDAY.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—(Special)—The Boers may gain by their strategy in which the British are forced to make Natal the main battle ground.

General Buller's first task must now be to raise the siege of Ladysmith. The Natal country is best adapted to Boer tactics and British losses will undoubtedly be heavy.

The transports arriving at Cape Town are being sent on to Durban.

### LOSSES AT ORANGE RIVER.

The skirmish before reported beyond Orange River station half-way between De Aar Junction and Kimberly, resulted in a loss of four British officers killed and wounded.

### KIMBERLY AND MAFEKING.

The news from Kimberly and Mafeking is re-assuring, but not recent. Both are holding out.

The Boers opened a general attack on Kimberly on the morning of the 7th but no damage was done up to the latest despatch of the 8th.

The Boers attack on Mafeking was repulsed, the British loss being trifling. The enemy lost fifty killed.

### A THREE HOURS FIGHT.

A three hours fight took place near Belmont, on the Orange River between two squadrons of the Tenth Hussars and 700 Boers. The British losses were a Lieut.-Colonel killed and three lieutenants and two privates wounded.

### MOVEMENT OF TRANSPORTS.

Transport carrying 4,900 men reached Capetown on the 11th.

Three troopships with 2600 men sailed from Southampton yesterday.

### BASUTOS REMAIN LOYAL.

Advices received at Capetown say the Basutos agree to remain loyal to Great Britain.

## W. C. T. U. CONVENTION

HALIFAX, Nov. 9.—The Dominion W. C. T. U. convention opens tonight in Fort Massey Presbyterian Church with a grand reception and welcome meeting. Delegates and representatives are here from every province in Canada. This afternoon a complimentary concert was given to the delegates by the pupils of the School for the Blind, at the close of which Mr. Fraser warmly welcomed the delegates and suggested that another department of work be added to the large number they have already taken up, having for its purpose the work of helping the blind either by giving notice to him where to find them or providing work for those already educated. Mrs. Rutherford, Dominion W. C. T. U. President, suitably replied.

At the opening meeting tonight addresses of welcome were delivered by Mrs. Chesley, President of the Nova Scotia W. C. T. U., and Mrs. Whiston, President of the Halifax local W. C. T. U. Mrs. Foster, Knowlton, Quebec, responded.

Greetings were given by Hon. Geo. Murray, Premier of Nova Scotia, Mr. Hamilton, Mayor of Halifax and Rev. Mr. Betty representing the Grand Division Sons of Temperance and Mrs. Gordon Wright of Manitoba. A large audience was present.

HALIFAX, Nov. 10th.—Dominion Convention met for business this morning at 9.30. Mrs. Rutherford in the chair. After minutes of executive were read and passed, Mrs. Chas. Matheson, of Charlottetown, P. E. I. was appointed reporter for Halifax Herald, Mrs. Dr. Sprague, of Sackville moved that each delegate wear a badge with her name and address, in order to avoid confusion. An amendment was moved that each Province wear a badge. Both were lost. Greetings were received from Lady Henry Somerset of England, Pres. of the World's W. C. T. U. and from Miss Agnes Slack, corresponding secretary of the world's W. C. T. U.

Mrs. Todd, fraternal, delegate from the United States and Mrs. Fields, one of the world's W. C. T. U. missionaries late of Bermuda were introduced to convention and gave kindly words of greeting.

A service in memory of F. E. Willard our departed leader was conducted by Mrs. Rutherford, Mrs. Asa Gordon, Dominion Supt. Evangelistic Dept. led the scripture reading and prayer. Rev. Dr. Black, of St. Andrews presbyterian church, Halifax, who had been the first in Canada to give Miss Willard, the privilege of speaking from a pulpit, told in pleasing words how it came about. Mrs. Archibald, of Halifax, Mrs. Todd, of Boston, Mrs. Matheson of Charlottetown, Miss Wiggins of Ontario and others spoke of the good which had come to them through meeting and conversing with Miss Willard.

Afternoon session opened at 2 p. m. After routine business reports were heard from Superintendants of Departments. The Dominion Treasurer's report came next. Total receipts \$1865.88. Expenditure \$640.16 Mrs. Rutherford, of Toronto President of the Dominion W. C. T. U. gave her annual address which was eloquent, forcible and full of valuable suggestions.
