**IN MEMORIAM**  
 THE LATE MR. JOHN MACLENNAN  
 The friends of Mr. John MacLennan will regret to learn of his sudden death, which took place on Thursday April 23rd, at the advanced age of 83 years. The deceased was in his usual health, when retiring about 9 o'clock, and on going to arouse him they were shocked to find he had passed into the great beyond, some hours before, death being due to heart failure. The late Mr. MacLennan, formerly resided at Elliott's where he was well and favorably known, but spent the past two years at Hartsville. He leaves to mourn three daughters, Mrs. McKenzie and Mrs. Elliott, residing at Elliott's and Mrs. Farrar, Barre, Vt., also two sons, Alexander of Quincy, Mass, and Murdoch, this city. The funeral took place on Saturday, and notwithstanding the bad condition of the roads many friends gathered at his home to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed. His remains were laid to rest in the Hartsville cemetery beside his wife, who predeceased him four years ago. The services at the home and grave were conducted by his pastor, Rev. A. Ferguson of Stratford.

**TORONTO TO HAVE GRAND STATION**  
 MONTREAL, April 24.—The Grand Trunk and C. P. R. Railways have just now decided on the plans for the Toronto Union Station, which it is estimated will cost between \$12,000,000 and \$15,000,000. They will be submitted to the Railway Board about May 15, and when accepted the work will proceed at once. Information to this effect has been given out by the Grand Trunk Railway officials, who point out that the cost of the project, which is a part of the big terminal scheme for Toronto, is not included in the figures quoted. The project, which will cost \$4,000,000, will be a matter for later consideration. Railway officials who have seen the plans for the station say when finished the depot will be the finest of its kind in the Dominion.

**CONDITION OF EMPEROR FRANCES**  
 VIENNA, Austria, April 24.—The condition of the health of Emperor Francis Joseph was satisfactory this morning, according to semi-official information given out at the palace of Schoenbrunn. His Majesty passed a good night having slept for a longer period than usual. The imperial patient's temperature was 97.5. His Majesty had a very good appetite for breakfast today and the doctors in attendance said their patient's general condition gives no cause for apprehension, as his strength has been well maintained.

**THE OPENING OF THE ST. LAWRENCE RIVER**

MONTREAL, April 23.—All is in readiness at the winter quarters at Sorel where the feet of the Dominion Government is waiting for the ice to clear before starting on its work of placing the buoys in position along the river between Montreal and Quebec. One of the most important features of the opening of navigation this year will be the using of the new channel from the Island of Montreal eastward for small craft. The dredging of this has been completed, and for a distance of thirty feet will be drawing less than twenty feet will be able to use this channel. This will do away with the trouble of having the voyagers of the big ocean liners impeded by tugs and small craft. Some three hundred buoys are to be placed by the Marine Department after the ice goes out, it will require according to A. Willard, Montreal Superintendent of the Marine Department, three days for the placing of the important buoys which must be in position before vessels can make their trips in the channel and navigation really open. Mr. Willard announced recently that the light-house as far west as Three Rivers are already in operation and that the day the ice goes out the houses along the route to Montreal will be requisitioned. He does not look for the ice to go out before April 28th as there has been practically no movement in the Michellieu so far and this river is generally clear before the Upper St. Lawrence.
