The position of the farm and school buildings is just what is needed to provide for the needs of the camp.

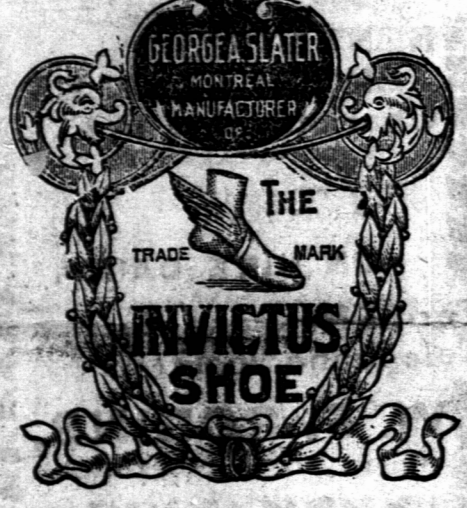

The cleanliness of the tents and of the men's attire is always a commendable feature with the battalion. This year it has its prestige with less labor as the large dining marquee 100 feet by 25 has saved both clothes and the equipment in the tents.

It has proved an unqualified success and the attention to the comfort and convenience of the men is appreciated by them. The electric light, telephone and commodious lavatory have been before commented on.

A most interesting sham fight took place yesterday afternoon. The following is the general idea of the operations: A force representing an enemy occupied a position, extending along the north side of Victoria Park, from N. E corner of Park to road leading into Victoria Barracks.

They found good cover in the wood which lines the road at that portion of the Park. A body of scouts was sent out to locate the enemy and discover its strength. In a short time the enemy was located in the position named. The battalion then formed for the attack. The right companies (1-3-5-7) formed firing line and supports, the remaining companies formed the reserves.

The firing line advanced cautiously and soon came in touch with the enemy. The attack was pressed home, the firing line advancing by successive rushes, taking advantage of cover wherever obtainable. The firing line was reinforced by the supports and later by the reserve. A flanking force was extended on the left of the enemy's position and subjected them to heavy flanking fire.

When the attacking force advanced within a hundred and fifty yards the position was taken by assault the shouts of the men and the blare of bugles giving a highly realistic idea of the charge in warfare. The operations of the afternoon were not only highly interesting but very instructive.

The men worked well, were kept well in hand and absolute quiet was maintained. The commandant Lt. Col. Moore, D. O. C. expressed himself as highly pleased with the manner in which his ideas were carried out by officers and men.

The plan left not a little open to the initiative of company commanders and they availed themselves of the opportunity and acquitted themselves with credit.

The reading marquee, used also for letter writing etc., is well patronized. An evangelistic meeting was held last evening. Band music, lectures, meetings, healthful sports, all these doubtless have contributed to the excellent behavior of the men. The Commandant expressed himself as more than pleased with this year's camp.
