Mrs. H. L. Beer Wins Island Singles Title

Ottawa Star Defeats Mrs. Jones Of Halifax In Three Thrilling Sets

Finals Reached In All Other Events Yesterday. O'Hara To Meet Wilson In Men's Singles Final.

Mrs. H. L. Beer of Ottawa won the Women's singles championship of the Island Open Tournament yesterday when she defeated Mrs. H. Jones, Halifax, in three thrilling sets by scores of 6-0, 1-6, 6-2. This was the only event finished as the remaining finals will be played today. The men's singles final will see Ross Wilson, Toronto, facing Joe O'Hara, Ottawa, for the second time in two weeks, as these two battled it out for the New Brunswick singles crown last week. Wilson today swept through his semi-final round match with Lloyd Keating, Moncton, in three straight sets by scores of 6-3, 6-2, 7-5, but O'Hara was forced to go four to gain the verdict over Garnet Raper, Saint John, in a ding-dong battle. The Ottawa player eventually won by scores of 4-6, 9-7, 7-5, 6-3.

Men's Doubles

In the men's doubles Alan Eaton and Ross Wilson, Toronto, gained the finals by taking a four-set victory from Harry Roper and Bev. Piers, Halifax. After the first set which Roper and Piers won 6-4, there was nothing to it but Wilson and Eaton and they fairly blew the Halifax pair off the court to the tune of 6-2, 6-1, 6-2. Wilson featured this match with some of the most brilliant tennis seen here this week, hitting everything that came near him with terrific speed which would not allow his opponents to even get their rackets on the ball.

In the other semi-final match, Lieutenant Commander J. C. I. Edwards and young Bobby Donahoe, Halifax battled through four long, hard sets before gaining the decision from Garnet Raper and Lloyd Keating, the Saint John-Moncton combination.

After taking the first two sets by scores of 7-5, 7-5, Donahoe and Edwards dropped the third set by the same score but managed to come back after the rest interval and gain the fourth set, 6-4, to take the match.

Island Team Defeated

Playing brilliantly Miss Kay Doyle, Halifax, and Miss Jean Wright, Petite Riviere, eliminated the last remaining hope of the Island fans when they defeated Miss Eleanor Bourke and Miss Evelyn Sinclair of Charlottetown in straight sets. The scores were 6-3, 6-1. They will now face Mrs. Beer, Ottawa, and Mrs. Jones, Halifax, in the finals.

Harry Roper, Halifax, and Miss Jean Wright, advanced through two rounds in the mixed doubles event to gain a berth in the finals. In the morning they eliminated the Ottawa team of Edgar Murphy and Miss Ora Davis in three hard sets by scores of 1-6, 6-4, 6-4, 7-5, while in the afternoon they defeated Mr. and Mrs. Bev. Piers, of Halifax, in the semi-finals in straight sets, 6-2, 6-2.

In this match Miss Wright featured with beautiful ground strokes and brilliant volleying.

On the other side of the draw, Eddie Condon and Mrs. H. L. Beer, Ottawa, defeated the favorite team for this event when they trimmed Commander Edwards and Mrs. H. Jones, Halifax, in straight sets, 6-1, 7-5.

Ladies Singles

The ladies singles final treated the large gallery to one of the best women's singles ever played on the local courts with both women hitting hard and taking plenty of chances.

Mrs. Beer opening out with a rush in the first set and by following her deep drives to the net volleyed Mrs. Jones' returns for beautiful placements down either side.

In the second set however, Mrs. Jones displayed her best tennis and with some lovely hitting evened the match by taking the set, 6-4. During this set Mrs. Beer could not gain the net with any degree of safety and was passed repeatedly down the wings.

Following the ten-minute rest period, Mrs. Beer again started her tactics of the first set and it was apparent that Mrs. Jones was put on the defense with Mrs. Beer changing the net and cutting off the returns for certain points. Mrs. Jones fought off two match points in the seven games and finally with a lovely passing shot took the game but it was last attempt as Mrs. Beer ran out the next game to take the match. Both players received a great hand at the finish.

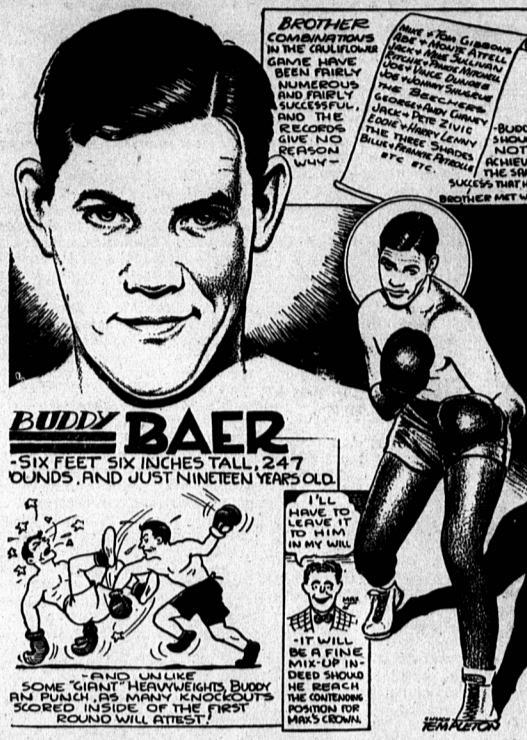

GLASGOW, August 8.—Scottish soccer clubs are optimistic regarding the 1935-36 season which opens Saturday. Economic conditions have continued to improve since the beginning of the year when better attendances were reflected in the balance sheets of the various clubs. Directors hope for bigger "gates" than for many years.

Glasgow Rangers, Champions and cup-holders, who meet Arbroath, new comers to first division football, on Saturday at Ibrox Park, have made practically no change in their personnel. On their record of last year they will again play a big part in the coming campaign.

CELTIC STRENGTHENED

Celtic, rival of Rangers for years, has disappointed its supporters for some time and this year presents a revamped team.

There will be little change in the Heart of Midlothian team but Arbroath has been strengthened by the signing of J. A. Johnson, Heart's international half-back who will operate alongside Colin McNab, the old Dundee player.

With a fine balance sheet Hamilton Academicals, like the Rangers, will present their cup-final line-up, but Motherwell will show changes. Kilmarnock expects to get first class service from last year's side and Queen of the South has brought back J. G. Dell, inside forward transferred to Preston North End two years ago.

TAKES ON JUNIORS

Transferring William Miller and R. Donnelly, Patrick Thistle cleared its bank overdraft and will have junior players replacing the two stars. Third Lanark return to the Upper Circle with high hopes.

Queen's Park has lost T. H. Bremner to Motherwell and W. Lyon to Celtic while H. Souter, Glasgow University find of last season has resigned. Clyde, as usual, has been confining its activities to Junior clubs and Aberdeen, Hibernians and Dundee have signed few new players.

All Alderstonian players have signed for the coming season with the exception of W. Thompson, capable left-half. Albion Rovers have several players on the sick list. Dunfermline has retained the players who avoided relegation so seasonally early this year. St. Johnstone has settled on its team with the exception of the centre-forward position.

LOUIS NOT YET RATED AMONG RING GREATS

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Still dazzled by the tan lightning of Joe Louis, the fight clans started drifting back to Broadway from Chicago today with only one voice holding out against the greatness of the negro warrior.

It was the voice of the loser in the promotional war that has been providing a bang-up semi-final to all the big heavyweight duels of the season. It was the voice of James J. Johnston, match-maker at Madison Square Garden, whose ace in the season's heavyweight maneuvering, Max Baer, now has moved over to the side of the enemy. Mike Jacobs and the 20th Century Sporting Club, for the privilege of stamping Louis leather next month.

I don't say he may not be a great fighter," declared Johnston, "but he's still got to do more than whip a panic-stricken Primo Carnera and a frightened-silly King Levinsky for me before I start bracketing him with Dempsey, Fitzsimmons, Jeffries and Corbett."

The Garden has Braddock as completely tied up as Jacobs has Louis.

Baer's Attitude Mysterious

"Furthermore," said Johnston, "don't be betting that Baer will fight Louis anymore than you would that Schmeling will come over here. It's might mysterious the way Baer's sore hands healed overnight. If his hands weren't hurt against Braddock, then it was his courage that wasn't so good. And if his courage wasn't good against Braddock, he'll die just thinking of Louis."
