BANKS CLOSE TWO DAYS - Banks in Summerside will be closed on both May 24 and May 26, it was learned yesterday. May 24 is a statutory Dominion holiday and the Town Council has decided to make May 26 a civic holiday. - S.

NEW VENDOR - Mr. John O. Cobb has been appointed government vendor at Summerside, it was learned officially yesterday. He succeeds Mr. Louis Dystant who is retiring June 1 after holding the position for eleven years. Mr. Cobb was employed with Palmer and Williams Co. Ltd., Summerside until some month ago when he left to go to Montreal to receive medical treatment. - S.

SHIP EXPECTED MAY 26TH - The third and last ship to load potatoes in Summerside for Britain this season, the Ekofors is expected to arrive in port on next Monday, May 26, according to Mr. Tom MacCallane, a member of the Potato Export Board. The potatoes are now being assembled in the warehouse at the Marine Wharf. - S.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT - Mr. Sterling Jeffrey, 16 years old, son of Mr. Lewis Jeffrey, Alma, P.E.I., broke a leg, received minor cuts on hand and head as the result of a fall from a truck wagon on which he was sitting. The wagon was loaded with sheep which they were taking to Oulton's Island. A board in the wagon broke, which caused him to fall forward and his leg caught in the wheel and the loaded wagon passed over him. Passers-by came to the rescue, and as it was near Dr. Shea's office, the Doctor fortunately arrived about five minutes after the accident. The injured boy was later taken to the Prince County Hospital where he is doing as well as can be expected. A

ROTARY MEETING - Mr. W. M. Roberts, Regional Employment Officer of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, Moncton was the guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club on Tuesday. He explained the work of the service in the past and what their duties would be in the future and said that if both the employer and the employee would cooperate with the commission it would benefit both. Referring to the work of the Summerside office he said that last fall in five days about 800 persons had been placed as potato pickers. Also 172 persons of Prince County had been placed in employment in other parts of the Maritimes through the Commission. Mr. Fred Birmingham was a guest. - S.

KINSMEN MEETING - The regular meeting of the Kinsmen Club of Summerside was held on Tuesday in Leo Coyle's Restaurant with Heath Warren in the chair. A letter from the Summerside Youth Centre Inc. was read inviting the Kinsmen Club to become a member of that body. After some discussion it was decided to defer decision until the next meeting and in the meantime certain information is to be obtained. Charlie Hogan, reporting for the Sports Committee said that Mr. Henry Landry had been appointed coach of the junior baseball team and that a club member would be appointed to assist him. Henry Wedge is the team manager. Norman Hogg was appointed general chairman of the Dominion Day project and Harold Arsenault was appointed in charge of constructing the booths for the concessions. The matter of a service project left over from a previous meeting was further discussed and no decision reached.

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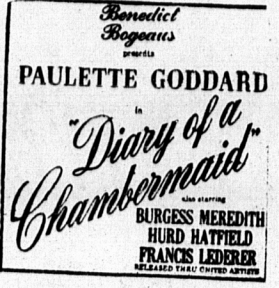

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Conservative Convention In Third Prince

Two candidates were chosen at a convention of Progressive Conservative voters of the Third District of Prince held in the Summerside Town Hall last evening. Mr. Peter Gallant, Egmont Bay, a former school inspector and at present a farmer who contested the district in the last election and was defeated by a very few votes, was again chosen as the candidate for assemblyman. Mr. Edward E. Arnett, Summerside, a barrister and a veteran of the second World War was chosen as the candidate for councillor. This will be his first experience as a candidate.

Both nominations were unanimous. Mr. Gallant's nomination was moved by Cyrus F. Gallant, Urbenville and seconded by Jeremiah Gallant, Mont Carmel. Mr. Arnett's nomination was moved by Peter Cameron, Lot 16 and seconded by Francis Simpson, Hamilton.

Mr. John F. Arsenault, Urbenville, convener presided. Resolutions were passed expressing confidence in the leadership of Hon. John Bracken, federally and Hon. Dr. W.J.P. Macdonnell, provincially.

Speakers included the newly elected candidates and Mr. J. A. Gillies, Charlottetown. Charles MacQuaid, Charlottetown, secretary of the Provincial Association, Heath Strong, K.C., M.L.A., E.H. Strong, K.C. and Hugh Morrison, all of Summerside. - S.

invited. The letter then dealt with two objections to giving the use of the diamond for hardball that had been given by the S.Y.C.I. With regard to the objection that children might be injured it was felt that if a proper backstop was erected there would be no more danger than at any ball game attended by children. With regard to the second objection that the cinder track that encircles the diamond would be injured cases were cited where the same condition exists and the diamond and track are used on alternate days with no injury to either. The letter also complained that Mr. S. Smith, the agent of the S.Y.C.I., had ordered the school boys off the diamond because they were playing hardball.

Councillor Schurman then moved the following resolution. Whereas it has been established that the Summerside Youth Centre Inc. make very little use of the ball grounds adjoining the High School property on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings during the ball season, providing they have erected suitable backstop. It being stipulated that no ball is to be played on Sundays and that the grounds be under the control and supervision of the chairman and members of the Park Committee, who will have authority in their discretion, operations are not carried on in a satisfactory manner.

Councillor Smallman said that the S.Y.C.I. represent various clubs and societies of the town and they feel that the playing of hardball would interfere with their activities and they are representative of a large portion of the town. He felt that backstop even forty feet high would not eliminate the danger to the smaller children. He said he would like to see hardball established some place and he felt that the time has come for the Town to acquire more property.

Acting Mayor Wedge said that he had spoken to two persons who have suitable property, but they did not indicate any willingness to sell.

Councillor Gorrill said that he is in favor of hardball and would like to see it played on the school grounds "but we are responsible to the people and if a child were killed we would be held responsible."

Councillor Morrison thought that a suitable backstop with an overhang would eliminate any danger.

Councillor Driscoll thought that baseball should be permitted there till other grounds could be obtained.

The Clerk read a letter from the Island Motor Transport Co. Ltd., advising that they were leasing the premises now known as the Prince Cafe and asking for certain non-parking areas to be established. They stated that by this new arrangement the buses would not traverse the busy parts of Water Street.

A motion was passed on motion of Councillor Smallman seconded by Councillor Gorrill that the Town approve the site and that sections of Spring and First Streets be designated non parking

areas as requested and that this arrangement can be revised at any time that the Council should consider necessary.

Councillor Gorrill brought up the matter of the former Allan building on Summer Street which is in process of being torn down. He said that for three weeks no work has been done on it and it is a bad looking mess so near the square and he felt something should be done.

Acting Mayor Wedge agreed and suggested that the Clerk write to the owner who is responsible to the residents of Fernwood and putting up quite a plea to have the power lines extended to their district. A motion was passed that this be done. There was some discussion about the position of the Board of Public Utilities and what action they might take at any time in the future. The Clerk reported that they are asking for a great deal of information. - S.

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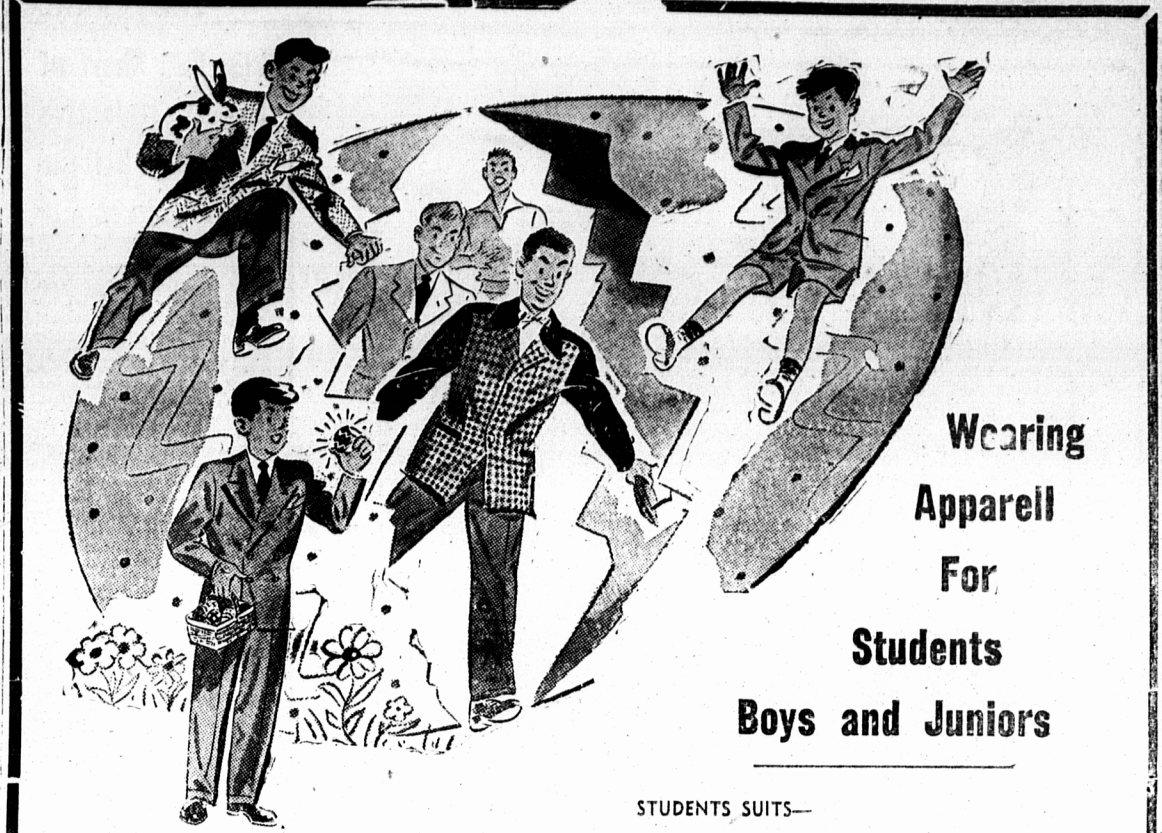

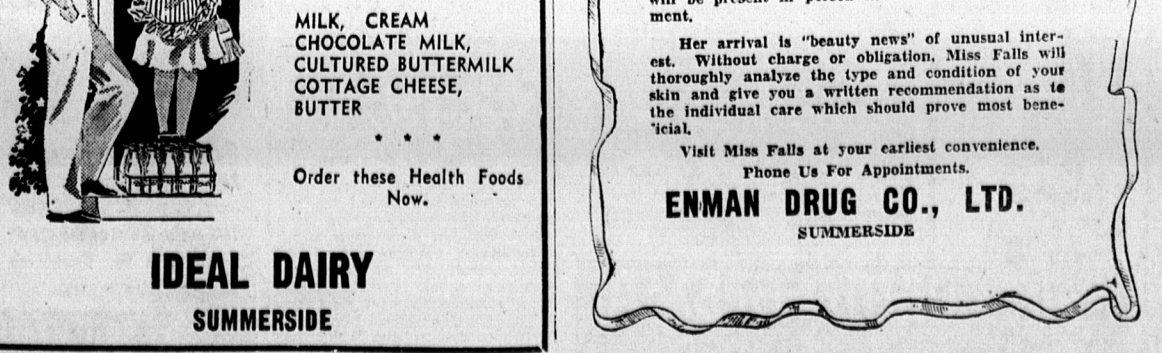
