GLENFINNAN.—The winter roads under the capable supervision of roadmaster D. J. Macdonald are kept well broken and passable at all times.—The energetic mail courier Mr. Michael Beagan brings the mails with punctuality and despatch.

THE STEAMERS.—The C. G. S., Earl Grey left Pictou at 7 a. m. Friday and docked in Georgetown at 9.55, with 32 tons freight, 40 sacks of mail and 46 passengers. The Minerva left Georgetown at 7 a. m. and docked at Pictou at 10.05. She had on board 26 tons of freight, 40 sacks of mail and 16 passengers. Both steamers will make a return trip Saturday.

HEALTH LECTURE.—Among the most instructive lectures delivered to the ladies of the Short Course may be mentioned those given by Dr. Alexander Ross. The first on "How to Keep Healthy," dealt with the necessity of fresh air, sunshine, and adequate amounts of rest and exercise, and the proper food required to maintain the best physical condition. The explanation of how disease germs attack the body and are fought off when the blood is in healthy conditions were given to enable the individual to keep well and strong. The second lecture was entitled "Common Sense Methods for the Care of the Sick." Many helpful suggestions were brought forth for treating the first symptoms of sickness, the diet necessary in different cases, rules for making some invalid drinks, and the necessity of regular administration of daintily served meals. The doctor emphasized the point of choosing a large, airy, cheerful room for a patient, by which means the chances of recovery were greatly increased. The necessity of rest, the treatment of fevers, children's diseases in general, all were dealt with in detail. Some important directions were given in the care of convalescents and the necessity of having rooms thoroughly cleaned as well as disinfected afterwards. These are greatly privileged to hear such helpful and interesting lectures from such an experienced physician.

SENTENCED.—The Robert Reid that was arrested in Summerside and taken back to Moncton charged with stealing from that city, accused pleaded guilty and after receiving a severe reprimand was sentenced to two years in the "Dorchester Penitentiary."

VERY WELL.—It is pleasing to learn that Judge Hector McDonald, who has been in the P. E. I. Hospital for some time receiving treatment for a severe illness is very well indeed. He is now able to get up and dress and walk around a little but he has not left the hospital yet.

Y.M.C.A. MEETING.—Mr. J. K. Ross, the new president of the Y. M. C. A., will preside at a meeting for the Y. M. C. A. on Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The meeting will be one of layment. Short discourses will be given on the topic "Prayer as Power in Service," and good music will be provided.

THE GOOD TEMPLARS.—Mr. S. H. Webb, the well known organizer for the Good Templars, who spent some weeks recently in P. E. I., arrived in Amherst Tuesday. He will spend a month in Cumberland visiting judges and doing organizing work. The Good Templars in that country are a very aggressive body of temperance workers.

THE MARKET.—The Charlottetown market was fairly well attended yesterday. Eggs took a big drop selling as low as thirty-two cents per dozen and some were sold as high as thirty-eight cents per dozen. Butter went lower in price selling at twenty-eight cents per pound. Chickens and fowl were disposed of at about the same price as last market day from one dollar to one dollar and a half a pair. Outside the market a goodly number of butchers met near so many as last market day, offered beef for sale by the quarter from seven to nine cents. This is one half cent less than was obtained last market day. The butchers holding stalls in the market retailed beef by the small quantity as last market day, from ten to eighteen cents.

RACES POSTPONED.—Owing to the bad state of the weather today the races which were to have been held on the ice at 2 o'clock, have been postponed until Saturday, provided, of course, conditions be favourable.

SCHOOL FOR BLIND.—Those in this province who have pupils attending the school for the Blind at Halifax will learn with pleasure of another subscription for the upkeep of the Institution. This time the donation comes from parties and firms in St. John's Nfld., and amounts to \$2,750.

THE MORWENNA.—The S. S. Morwenna which was formerly engaged in the passenger trade between Montreal, Sydney, Charlottetown, Summerside and St. John's, Nfld., is now plying between Pernambuco, South America, and St. John's. On Saturday she arrived in St. John's from Pernambuco and loaded a cargo of fish for that port.

THE MARITIME PROVINCES.—Mr. R. H. Bruce of St. John's who had been to the Old Country has just returned to his home and in an interview with one of the papers in that city tells of the rest with which the Old Country people are turning to the East of Canada and investing in the industries here. He was surprised at the knowledge these people possessed of the Dominion. He said the investors had lately been investigating the possibilities of Eastern Canada, and especially of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and evidently look for rapid developments here.

THE CONDITIONS.—Friday morning was ushered in with gusty winds, light rain falls and "Greasy" side walks. On Thursday morning at nine o'clock the temperature was twelve above zero but during the day it became milder till at night it was twenty-five above. A southwest to southeasterly wind that blew in gusts came up and the temperature still gained till Friday morning. It registered forty above. The condition of the streets made by the rain on the snow is of the worse. No one can get along at a faster rate than a snail's pace, and even then not without sitting down once or twice, for the ice is just like glass. When these conditions are over or when the weather becomes more lenient, citizens will be thankful.
