BACK FROM LABRADOR.

—HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 27.—Professor MacMillan, who accompanied Commander Peary on his trip to the North Pole, arrived in Sydney yesterday after a three months' trip to Labrador. Professor MacMillan was accompanied by C. J. Small of New England who built the twenty-five foot motor boat in which the trip was made.

—Professor MacMillan's mission was ornithological and ethnological. He visited Moravian mission stations and studied the equipment. He left his boat at Battle Harbor where he will call for it next year on an expedition to occupy two years' during which a search is to be made for a new land in the Polar Sea which Peary says he saw. Also the interior of Greenland will be explored. The present trip was made in the interest of Harvard University and the American Museum of Natural History.

MURPHY'S LECTURE.

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—"Drinking too much liquor cost your club the flag." This remark made by owner Dreyfuss of the victorious Pittsburghs in 1907 at Charles W. Murphy, president of the Chicago National League Club, started Murphy on the line of thought that caused him to issue his positive order against drinking and cigarette smoking by his ball players. Mr. Murphy said yesterday. Two incidents Mr. Murphy quoted as having fixed his determination.

"We went into the first game with Philadelphia in the world's series in 1910," he said, "with confidence. Then one of our star players misjudged a fly that a boy could have caught and also struck out the first two times he went to bat. I traded this player off, but I did not know until later that this man came into the hotel intoxicated at 3.30 in the morning of the day of the game.

"When I was in Cincinnati I learned that certain individuals there were in the habit of taking some members of the Chicago ball club out to road houses at night and getting them intoxicated in order to weaken our playing strength.

"There's one other thing," continued Mr. Murphy, "I am not going to have young men debauched by joining my club. We are constantly bringing in young men between 18 and 20 years of age and hereafter on the Chicago national team they are going to be started off right. If a youngster sees a veteran drinking

DEMONSTRATION FOR MADAME ALBANI.

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—A movement to organize a monster testimonial performance in honor of Mme. Albani has been started by friends of the diva in the city in view of the fact that the great singer is reported to have suffered severe financial losses and to be now in straitened circumstances. It is felt that as Mme. Albani spent the early years of her life in and near Montreal and made several of her greatest triumphs in this city, such a benefit would be a fitting expression of the esteem in which she is held.

AN INSURANCE HINT.

OTTAWA, September 27.—Unusual significance attached to the speech made by Hon. J. D. Hazen at the banquet of the Canadian Manufacturers' association, the minister of marine and fisheries dealing boldly and effectively with the question of marine insurance and its effects upon the trade of Canadian seaports. He explained the manner in which the British North American clause in marine insurance policies on the Atlantic discourages traffic to Canadian ports, not merely by increasing of insurance rates paid by the shippers belonging to lines plying regularly to Canada, but by virtually shutting the transatlantic steamers out of the Canadian trade altogether. The effect is that the volume of oceanic transportation available to the products of Canada thus is seriously curtailed.

Efforts had been made, Mr. Hazen said, to induce Lloyd's to use their influence to have this clause eliminated, but without success. Accordingly he was sure that he would not be hauled over the coals by his colleagues if he were to suggest to the manufacturers that they get together and formulate a scheme of insurance and further to suggest that if they came with a scheme the government would give it sympathetic attention.

Dealing with terminal facilities for grain shipping in Montreal, he stated that the present capacity, with its capacity of 2,400,000 bushels, marked a recent increase of 1,600,000. If necessary the government would not hesitate to effect still further increases.
