SEEDING IN THE PRAIRIE COUNTRY.

The Manitoba Free Press, a most enterprising daily published in Winnipeg, has at great pains, collected reports and statistics of the seeding operations carried on this spring in Manitoba and the Territories. From this we learn that the season has been a most favorable one as regards weather and soil conditions. On the 7th instant seeding was almost finished, with the result of a much wider area planted than in any previous year. The reports appear to be almost absolutely uniform from all over the Northwest. There has been no broken weather to interrupt the farming operations. This has afforded full time for the careful cultivation of the soil. Following the wheat sowing the sowing of the coarser grains had begun, and already, on the date above named, the wheat was showing green above the ground in many districts. The Free Press tells that, "almost every correspondent reports an increased acreage, amounting in some districts to 25 per cent over that seeded in 1902; so that if the same propitious circumstances prevail in a moderate measure throughout the season a bumper crop is assured. The seeding has evidently been carefully, though extensively done, and upon nature depends the rest." This is a most reassuring report. Our fertile Northwest is now known to produce the wheat plant at its best. The early seeding is accounted for by the fact that the grain is sown when but a few inches of the surface has been thawed. But there when the spring once sets in the warm weather advances with

easy stride, with with little of the chilling winds so common in the eastern Provinces in May and June. The plagues of grasshoppers which were so common twenty-five and thirty years ago, are now no longer dreaded. The summer frosts, once a frequent source of loss and disappointment, have become less from year to year. Drainage, and the widespread operations of cultivation, have warmed the soil. Providence has smiled upon the labors of the husbandmen, and to-day the people inhabiting the prairie country are full of health and hope. It is there that the future growth of our great Dominion must be most rapid, and we of the east on national and patriotic grounds can rejoice with our brothers of the western wheatlands in the bright prospects of the present year.

MR. CARNEGIE AND CANADA.

Mr. Carnegie has been saying some disagreeable things about Canada in an interview with the Ironmonger's Journal of London. Among other things he said that Canada can have no future except as a part of the United States. This shows the ignorance of the great ironmaster. Not that he is an ignorant man in a general way. He knows the iron and steel business, has some knowledge of literature, and no doubt some knowledge of the United States. But his published interview betrays a woeful ignorance of Canada, and of the growth, prospects and possibilities of this country. He also displays great ignorance of the desires of the Canadian people. Having annexed himself to the Republic he appears desirous that Canada should go and do likewise. This illustrates the familiar proverb that there is no zeal like that of a new convert.

But there are in Canada some five millions of people who think for themselves and they have shown again and again in the most unmistakable way that they wish to remain British subjects. Nor has Mr. Carnegie any power or persuasiveness that will induce them to change their minds in that regard. No doubt Canadians in general will read his latest deliverance with a measure of disgust. Several Canadian cities, towns and villages have accepted his gifts of public library buildings without suspecting what is now only too apparent, that he had in view when bestowing these gifts the weakening of their allegiance to the British Sovereign and Empire. He himself has now opened their eyes, and at the same time done a great deal toward lessening such respect as they may have had for Andrew Carnegie.

Ontario now has an income tax under which the first \$700 is exempted. A bill before the Legislature proposes to increase the exemption to \$1,000, and also to reduce the rate on salary or income received above \$1,000. Here we have an income tax with but \$200 exempted. The Island income tax is very illiberal in the matter of not exempting the smaller salaries or incomes. This will appear from a comparison with the income tax of the Mother Country or any other country that we know of.

The Hamilton Times, a prominent Liberal newspaper, gives currency to the report that at the conclusion of the Gamey inquiry Hon. J. R. Stratton will resign his seat both in the Cabinet and the House and will appeal to his constituents and will take re-election to mean vindication. The Times adds significantly: "But whether the Government will take the same view of it and reserve him his portfolio remains to be seen, but the fact that Mr. Stratton has not been persona gratia with several members of the Government would indicate that so good an opportunity to get rid of him will not be lost by them." As the Times is supposed to be the organ of Hon. J. M. Gibson, who is a colleague of Mr. Stratton's, it would seem not unlikely that the retirement of the latter from the Government is expected to be permanent. Not very much has
