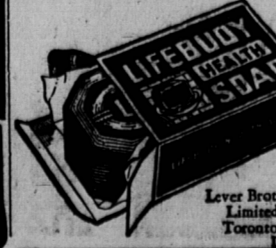

upon the venture. Here we have the inducement coming from a member of the Dominion Government, and in that case the Dominion Government must be presumed to have acted; he held out the inducement and through him, the Dominion Government, to engage Mitchell.

I need not go into that, because my hon. friend the mover of the resolution has gone into it very fully. Then who was responsible? I submit the responsibility falls upon the partner who held out the inducement to the other partner in the transaction,—even to dictating the form of the appointment and requesting the affixing of the great seal of the Province to it. And let me add this, that that very thing was what induced those retired Indian officers to deal with Mitchell. It is stated so in their evidence and it is only reasonable to suppose, that seeing this appointment under the great seal of the Province hanging in this man's office in London, receiving letters from him on the embossed letter paper of the Government of Prince Edward Island, they would naturally feel no hesitation about dealing with him as the agent of the Government. Otherwise they would not have dealt with him at all.

It has been contended by people who should have more sense than those men dealt with Mitchell, all they did so at their own peril; it is argued that there are many adventurers selling mining stock and oil stock, but does the Government undertake to reimburse the victims of these transactions? That is not a parallel at all. This man was sent over as agent of the Government with appointment under the Imperial seal of the Province, to be shown to all those with whom he dealt and we have the evidence of those men that they would not have dealt with Mitchell under any other circumstances.

I do not think it is necessary for me to go into this matter very much further. I think it is clear to everyone prepared to take a fair-minded view, that the responsibility in this case has been brought home clearly and conclusively to the Government of Canada. But there is one other phase of the matter to which I would like to draw the attention of the House. A great deal of attention has been paid, by the Federal Government to questions of immigration, and properly so. We have need in this great country of many settlers, and a campaign of immigration has been carried on somewhat aggressively, and as a result a great deal of Federal revenues have been expended on these activities. I would like to ask Mr. Speaker what proportion of this money has been expended on Prince Edward Island? Very little, if any. Nothing in fact! Now we have, through their immigration policy, been led into a position where we can scarcely hold up our heads in the face of Great

Britain and the rest of the civilized world. Isn't it only fair, isn't it only equitable, isn't it only reasonable that the Federal Government should come to the assistance of this Province in that respect at least? If they do not feel disposed to expend the same amount of money on this Province which they are expending on the Western and other provinces in helping to colonize and bring out immigrants, should they not at least give us this comparatively small amount of money to place us in the position we occupied before we were put in this embarrassing situation through the activities of Mitchell, who was engaged really by the Federal Government itself? (Applause.)

It has already been mentioned by the mover that this matter would be a small thing for the Federal Government to undertake comparatively speaking. It would be a much larger and more serious problem for this Province to meet. But apart from that altogether in plain justice and fairness to this Province, surely we are entitled to be replaced in such a position that we can again as a Province look the world in the face. That this dishonor be removed from the fair name of the Island; that is all we are asking; that is the object of the resolution, nothing more. Further than that, that justice should be done to those men who trusted in Mitchell.

It has been said by the hon. Leader of the Opposition, I do not think he should have said it—that these men, because they may have been credulous, were therefore not entitled to be reimbursed. Surely that is not an argument worthy of being stated on the floor of this House! I do not think any attention will be given to that. These men had every reason to trust to Mitchell because he had the authority of the Government of this Province, and if he said that they trusted too much without making proper enquiries, what will be said of the Government of this Province which believed the statements of Mitchell in regard to the standing of these prospective settlers; that they were all wealthy men, receiving payments of money sufficient to keep them comfortably for the rest of their lives,—a statement absolutely untrue. Their pensions were only for a short period of two or three years, and they amounted to only a small sum even when the whole amount was commuted; scarcely enough to settle them here. That this could have been ascertained by the Government of this Province at any time on enquiry there is no doubt. Apparently no enquiry was made, and they believed Mitchell's story implicitly. My hon. friend is quite right as to the desirability of securing as settlers a class of wealthy men but when we bring out men who have barely enough to settle themselves and place them on four acres of land with a small bungalow and nothing else, it is a different proposition, and it would be a great hardship even to men accustomed to conditions here. How



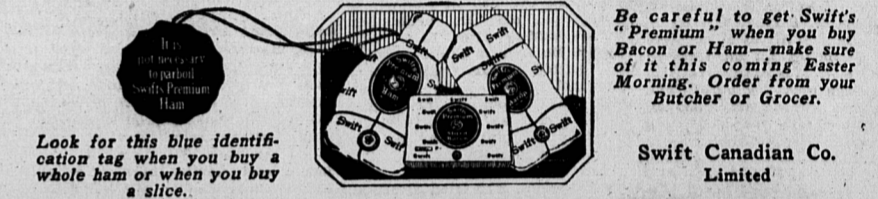

many of ourselves could make good under those circumstances, born and brought up here as we have been? very much further debate on this resolution. I think that upon second thought my hon. friend the Leader of the Opposition will support not upon this Province in the final resolution. He has not stated whether he would or not.
