THE WINTER STEAMSHIP SERVICE.

As the stars in their courses fought against Sisera of old, so wind and wave, ice and storm, with now and then a suspicion of human devices, contend against the western route to the mainland. We called attention yesterday to what had happened in past years, the winter boat put on that route being suddenly snatched away, without notice after one or two trips. This has again happened, though fortunately at a time when there is, as we understand, comparatively little accumulation at Summerside of freight for the mainland.

The fact is that the dock at Tormentine is very poorly equipped for the transhipment of freight. It is also in an exposed position, where the full force of the prevalent north-east, east and southeast gales of the winter, is felt, while the approach is flanked by dangerous reefs, and the tidal currents at this, the narrowest portion of the Strait, are strongest. These things make the passage and the landing of freight difficult in stormy or thick weather, and our winter captains, to whom a very large measure of discretion in their choice of routes is allowed, have always avoided the route from Summerside to Tormentine when a pretext could be found for doing so.

As we understand it, the settled policy of the Department is to keep

the two winter steamers on the same route. In the stress of mid-winter this is undoubtedly the prudent course. They are then in a position to render mutual assistance in case of either boat getting into trouble, such as sometimes happens. We sympathize with our western friends in their desire for a direct service, the more so as Charlottetown has had strong reason for complaint in years past of the boats being taken away from here, without notice while the route from this port to Picton was easily practicable.

Last winter the Province enjoyed the best winter service it ever had, with both steamers plying between Charlottetown and Picton during the greater part of the winter. We hope and trust that a strong effort will be made to render like good service in the same way during the months to come. No one expects impossibilities to be accomplished. The task imposed upon the captains is at best a difficult and arduous one, and if the best that can be done is done, as was the case last winter, there will be little to complain of in that line. But until we have a more certain means of communication by means of the Tunnel we must expect at some time a recurrence of the long and terrible winter blockades of the past.

A NEW DANGER—CHLORODYNE TABLETS.

A warning note reaches The Guardian from a professional source against the rapid prevalence of the use of chlorodyne tablets or lozenges by little boys and girls and in some cases by adults. It is affirmed that since the enforcement of the prohibition against the purchase and use of cigarettes by young persons, the use of chlorodyne lozenges as a substitute has spread alarmingly in this city.

Chlorodyne is a powerful drug, varying somewhat in composition, but containing morphine, chloroform, prussic acid and extract of Indian hemp, and flavored with sugar. It is used in medicine, but should never be taken by any person sick or well except under medical direction. Its frequent, or continued use, even in small quantities, tends to form a most degrading and incurable habit, comparable only to those created by the use of opium, morphine or cocaine.

How widely the chlorodyne habit has become prevalent here, we do not know, but some accounts represent it as alarming. One little girl is reported as saying, "I love it. I spend all the money I can get for chlorodyne lozenges." Boys are, however, most addicted to the vice. So far, it is believed, those indulging in the use of the drug in this seductive form are mostly unaware of their deadly peril.

It seems probable, also, that parents are either unaware of their children's purchases, or have given little thought to the matter. Druggists have the full knowledge, but are accustomed to deal in drugs for medicinal uses, and may not have taken thought that the use of chlorodyne was being used for gratification and not for purposes of cure. If any one is in doubt as to the deadly peril from the habitual use of this drug by children, let inquiry be made of the family physician.

The Guardian believes the matter is one of such gravity as to call for prompt and energetic action. The sale of chlorodyne tablets to children should be forbidden under penalty. We believe every druggist in the city would promptly respond to any movement for suppressing what is known to be a growing evil. We think the Board of Health, if that body will but make inquiry and ascertain the facts, will promptly make a recommendation, on which a civic by-law might be based to suppress the sale. In any case parents and teachers have a duty in this matter toward those who are under their care.
