### COLORS FOR THE LIVING ROOM.

The exposure of a room should determine the choice of its color scheme. If its windows face south or west, it will be flooded with sunlight the major portion of the day, and cool colors, those having a good deal of blue in their make-up should be used in it. If its windows face toward the gray north light warm gray on a cool gray ground and little or no sunshine enters, or if its eastern exposure receives sunlight during the morning but gray light for the rest of the day, warm colors, those with red or yellow in their make-up, will bring cheer and brightness into it. Because walls form the background for an interior scheme, careful consideration should be given to their color. A wallpaper with a small geometric design in a face toward the gray north light warm gray on a cool gray ground and little or no sunshine enters, was chosen as the foundation color.

It is not always understood that gray can be either a warm or a cool color. If it has rose or yellow cast, it takes on a warm hue; if it is a blue-gray or a steel-gray, as it is generally called, it is decidedly cool in tone. A green-gray can be either cool or warm. It all depends on the whether blue or yellow predominates in its composition. The wallpaper design had a yellow cast, and in this way the mixed-light condition was met satisfactorily.
