### Heirlooms Resurrected By Fortunate Folk Bent On Attending Coronation

Responsible for a great deal of the richness of jewelry this year, the Coronation ceremony is exercising an influence toward grandeur that is reflected in every luxury-loving centre in the world.

In England, however, the style of the Coronation jewels to be worn by perreeses at this most magnificent ceremony by the deac is set by order of the Earl Marshall in accordance with the traditions handed down for centuries.

When the ceremonies were first planned the required headress was to have been the tiara perreeses at the Coronation court functions, but the abdication of King Edward having brought a Queen also to be crowned, the new instructions of the Earl Marshall called for perreeses to wear a coronet designed according to their rank. Tiaras will be worn by the less privileged women.

According to ancient custom, the perreeses will carry their coronets to Westminster Abbey and don them immediately after the Queen is crowned.

Concession to Hair-Dressing.

Although the old customs will be followed in these regards, a concession to modern hair-dressing will be made in the way the tiaras are worn. They will be worn farther back on the head, where they are now considered, with the vogue of flat hair-dressing, more becoming than at the front of the head.

Necklaces also have leaped into the forefront of style, for women at the Coronation will wear all the richest jewels their family vaults offer.

Family heirlooms are being brought in large quantities to London jewelers for renovation and cleaning for the ceremony, and there are astonishing orders for diamond, pearl and amethyst necklaces; in fact, for necklaces of all precious stones, as well as bracelets, brooches and pendants.

Shown on the above map is the military cordon set up by Britain, France, Germany, Italy and Portugal, effective March 13, 1936, to keep a Spanish revolution and not a battleground of national powers. Coastline areas between the dotted lines show how the nations have divided up the blockade. Portuguese troops patrol the Portuguese-Spanish border under the supervision of 130 "international observers." France patrols her border.
