A M ALGAMATION

MONTREAL, June 10—Consolidation of British and Canadian capital in the forest, sawmill and manufacturing Corporation in the British Empire is foreseen in the announcement today by Lord Rothermere of the proposed amalgamation of the Anglo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Mills Ltd., of which he is President, with the Canada Power and Paper Corporation, which is controlled by the interests of the Canadian financiers, Sir Herbert Holt and J. H. Gundy.

No new capital issue is contemplated, the merger being effected by exchange of the ordinary shares of Anglo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Mills for common shares of Canada Power and Paper Corp., on a basis of 24 shares of the capital stock of the latter for every 100 shares of the former.

General Assembly Turns Down Appeal

HAMILTON, Ont., June 10—The case of Rev. Dr. Robertson Orr of Vancouver, whose name was removed from the rolls of the Presbyterian Church last year, will not be reconsidered by the General Assembly.

Rev. Dr. Orr was suspended by the Assembly which met at Ottawa on the strength of a civil court decision in which he was involved. When 129 of his former parishioners petitioned that the case be reconsidered, the present Assembly appointed a special committee to examine the new case. The committee reported today that the case should not be reopened and this verdict was immediately accepted by the Assembly.

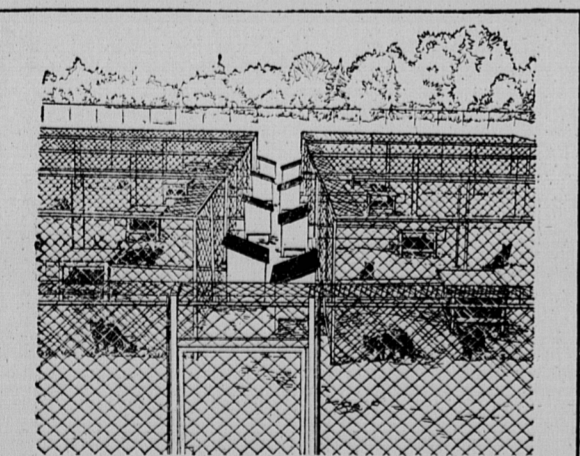

The Lewis Bros., who at present are engaged in drifting for mackerel report them extremely scarce. Saturday night they drifted as far south of Alberton as Malpeque and yet only had nine mackerel in the morning.

The low prices now prevailing and the scarcity of lobsters are causing some uneasiness to our local fishermen. Unless a decided change for the better takes place soon most of the fishermen will not make enough to pay for their new gear.

At the meeting of the Alberton branch of the Maritime Fisheries, Mr. Emerson Matthews was appointed a delegate to attend the convention to be held in Halifax the latter part of the month.
