"ORPHANS OF THE STORM"

One Whole Year Spent in Constructing "Orphans of the Storm," Dramatic Epic

THE WORK OF ONE MIND
Gigantic and Tremendously Costly Screen Spectacle Coming Here Soon

Construction of D. W. Griffith's new motion picture "Orphans of the Storm," which is based on the well-known stage play "The Two Orphans," and which, released through United Artists Corporation is coming this week to the Prince Edward Theatre, occupied one year in preparation, filming and finishing. Mr. Griffith's great studio estate at Mamaroneck, just outside New York City, was the scene of the operation.

Old Paris, Bel-Air, Revolutionary Tribunal, and Versailles salon—they are all there. They illustrate the Ancient Regime and French Revolutionary events with which Mr. Griffith has developed and enlarged the famous Kate Claxton stage story. For the rule of the Bourbons it was necessary to show the Court and nobility, and for the cataclysm itself one of the public places where the struggles were fought and where the gullotine performed its work.

These could not be advantageously done in France because the architecture is changed and the old look of things has vanished. The Griffith staff, therefore, designed directly from old prints and engravings and was assisted throughout by scholars such as Prof. Arthur D. Noyes, of Harvard, thoroughly familiar with the historical aspects of the French Revolution. Mr. Griffith's then Frank Workman, Mr. Griffith's construction chief, built a real wonder in "Old Paris."

The main part of this is a full-size reproduction of the ancient Place de Greve. Bigger than anything hitherto done in the East, it is comparable only to the Los Angeles movie Babylon that was built for Mr. Griffith's "Intolerance." For there were literally hundreds of buildings, showing not only the square but the streets leading out of it; cement-and-mortar cunningly supplementing lath-and-plaster; "practical" houses in the quaint prison of Salpêtrière; the great fountain in the centre; the terrible scaffold at the far end; and (looking the other way) the grand perspective of the towers and pinnacles of Paris. It was a triumph not only to the camera eye, but to the wider range of human optics.

Into this scene were introduced the bustle and action of a main city artery in those times. This was succeeded by the struggle between royalists and people, in which thousands of players took part. Cannons, horses, pikemen, murder-crazed Revolutionary women, king's guards with muskets; people's barricades and sorties, added to the verisimilitude.

From a high elevation Mr. Griffith directed. He had his lieutenants in each of the sections, and

each unit of the thousands of persons was coached in the exact role. After the costumes, make-ups and positions were perfected, the director and his men imbued the crowds with the spirit of the scene. Most of the fighters were Latins from France and Italian metropolitan beauty.

Around this hall played a battery of cameras, now in perspective, now at close-ups; one moving vertically instead of horizontally—the cameraman in his camera elevator getting the wix tops and the hat tops as well as the rest of the scenery. It was the age of wigs, gigantic white, curled, pomaded; of hoops and panniers, brocades and velvets; of jeweled fans, masks, corsages and buckles. The bravery looks the real thing not only on the film but to the eye viewing the actual studio. It is at any rate a most faithful replica.

In still another mode is the great Revolutionary Tribunal, the judges of which condemned the suspects to the guillotine in droves. The focal point of the Reign of Terror, its frowning tribunal, great spaces, sinister lighting, and the "Mountain" of side benches occupied by Jacobins, have been admirably caught by Mr. Griffith. A corner of a courtroom might have served as a set for the scene, but he wished to present Danton's great speech that effects a reprieve.

The rate of Paris, the scene of execution the thieves' quarters the Cathedral of Notre Dame, are some of the other scenes by which "Orphans of the Storm" evokes a past now largely obliterated. The complexity of it all is astounding.
