Hints for the Motorists

AVOIDING THE CLOGGED RADIATOR

Don't Let Rust And Dirt Collect For Long Periods

FOREIGN MATTER OF ANY KIND, which enters the cooling system, will tend to coat over the insides of the metal radiating passages, thus reducing the escape of heat. It also may actually clog a part of the water passages, preventing flow through them and practically speaking, reducing the size and effectiveness of the radiator. Under ordinary circumstances, a dirty or partially "plugged" radiator may serve all right, but when unusual hill climbing is demanded on a particularly hot day, there is likely to be a deal of boiling over and annoying stops to refill are required. The first consideration is to keep foreign matter out by supplying it with the neatest and of the system and this best done "softest" water obtainable. Water should always be put in through the strainer fitted in the filling neck, and if this becomes damaged, it should be replaced or repaired. It should be removed and cleaned occasionally. While the strainer and the use of clean water will prove against the entrance of most of the larger dirt particles, there is no means of preventing the entrance of mineral matter dissolved in the "hard" water used in many districts. As this hard water is lost through evaporation, all the mineral contained in it is left in the radiator and in time, forms a heat insulating and passage clogging scale on all inside metal surfaces. The use of rain water, instead of the ordinary hard water, is recommended in sections where foreign matter remains in a radiator, or the more difficult, it becomes to dislodge it and to restore diminished cooling ability. Most of the ordinary sediment can be flushed out of a radiator merely by forcing water through it under moderate pressure, and the oftener this is done, the longer special cleaning processes can be put off. By removing the upper and lower rubber connections a garden hose can be fitted first to the lower and then to the upper radiator connection and water run through first in one direction and then in the other, the drain cock being left open. The filler cap on and the water from the outlet being directed where it will do no harm. Water should also be freely flushed through in a radiator, in the same manner, to remove the rust therein, which is an important factor in clogging radiator passages.

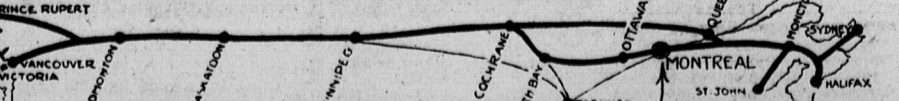
