Dr. Grigg's Funeral Largely Attended

The following clipping from a Butte exchange will be interesting to relatives as Dr. Grigg is a brother of Mr. John Grigg, of Tyne Valley, P. E. I.

Friends and professional colleagues of Dr. T. A. Grigg, who died Monday suddenly at Pocatello, Idaho, from a heart attack, attended the obsequies yesterday afternoon at 228 South Excelsior street. An exceptionally large cortege of cars followed the flower-laden casket to Mount Moriah cemetery. The reception room of the Grigg home was crowded while Rev. E. J. Groeneveld conducted the funeral services and gave a brief sketch of Dr. Grigg's life. Mrs. Paul Ballor sang "Crossing the Bar," "Lead Kindly Light," and "Work for the Night Is Coming." The honorary pallbearers formed an aisle between the door and the street while the casket was carried out.

The active pallbearers were Dr. R. C. Monahan, Alex Meagher, H. L. Maury, Alexander Anderson, Grover Nisler and Clem Barben.

At the cemetery following the ritual by Reverend Groeneveld, the War Mothers' organization gave its simple ceremony of placing blooms on the casket. H. H. Makinson, of the Grand Army also contributed his floral tribute.

Mrs. T. A. Grigg, who was in Los Angeles at the time of her husband's death, arrived Wednesday, accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. Joanna McCready, and her niece, Mrs. May Benepe, of Bozeman, both of whom were wintering in Los Angeles. Other mourners from out of town were Mrs. Sabina Miller of Laurel, Miss Winnifred Benepe, of Dillon, Dr. and Mrs. Roy Grigg, of Bozeman and Dr. and Mrs. Leon Grigg of Aberdeen, Wash. Practically the entire membership of the Silver Bow Medical society attended the funeral. A carload of floral offerings accompanied the casket.

Forty Years in Butte

Dr. Thomas A. Grigg at the time of his death had rounded out 40 years of professional practice in Butte. He was born in Prince Edward Island, Canada, 1861. His father, also a physician died at the age of 81. Dr. Thomas Grigg was graduated in medicine from the medical school of the University of Pennsylvania, but in Butte confined his practice to the eye, ear, nose and throat. He held a special diploma from the Philadelphia Polyclinic for eye, ear, nose, throat and lung practice. Before coming to Butte he practiced at Mahoney City, Pa., and Lake Chelan, Wash. He was a member of the American Medical Association, the various local medical associations and the State Medical Society and the Silver Bow Medical Society. He had been examining physician for the Y. M. C. A. at Butte and for the Modern Woodmen of the World. He was a member of Damon Lodge No. 1, Knights of Pythias, University Club, Fraternal Aid Union and Mahoney City Lodge of the A. F. and A. M. in Pennsylvania. He served four years as alderman from the Sixth ward, beginning in 1910.

In 1888 Dr. Grigg married Miss Joanna Miller of his home town in Prince Edward Island, who survives him. His two sons, Roy and Leon, are respectively physician and dentist, the former practicing in Bozeman and the latter in Aberdeen, Wash. Mrs. Joanna McCready, a daughter, makes her home in Los Angeles. There are several grandchildren.

Dr. Grigg operated extensively in mines and oil enterprises in various parts of the state and at the time of his death was actively interested in these operations. He had realty holdings in Montana and Washington.
