New Mix Thriller Packed With Action And Novelty

TOM IN AIR ADVENTURE FILM SCORES AGAIN AT CAPITOL THEATRE.

FBO approaches the eternally popular "western" from a new angle in the Tom Mix starring vehicle, "The Drifter", which began its local engagement at the Capitol Theatre yesterday, with the result that the feature commends itself as being one of the most novel and entertaining offerings to come before the attention of this critic for some time. The novel perspective which distinguishes "The Drifter", finds its root first of all in the fact that the story has a modern locale, as is indicated by the fact that a sensational airplane flight figures prominently in the many thrills which the production provides. At the same time, the background is positively "western" albeit a new note in this type of diversification is struck in the latest Mix contribution to the screen. What is noticeably patent in appraising the feature is the fact that it is pure entertainment—entertainment that will bring relaxation and adventure to every member of the family, from the most enthusiastic small boy to the most blasé adult. The story of "The Drifter" is told in a simple, direct fashion. The theme is devoid of any weighty problems. The characters are natural, everyday human beings. In the new film, Tom is a marshal, who, in disguise, is searching for narcotic smugglers. A chance purchase of a white mule throws him into the midst of a neighborhood struggle for a secret gold mine. The mule is the only living creature which knows the way to the mine. Tom's efforts on behalf of Dorothy Dwan, as the heroine whose deceased grandfather owned the mine, hurl him into a tumbling procession of thrills. Not the least of these is his ride on the wings of an airplane whose pilot seeks to throw him off by intricate stunting. When the pilot abandons Tom to his fate on the ship and leaps into the air to descend by parachute, Tom makes a flying tackle from the wing of his plane and—well, we won't spoil the biggest thrill of the picture by anticipating what happened to Tom then. Dorothy Dwan makes a virile but wholesomely feminine heroine for Mix, and the portrayals of Barney Furey, Bernard Bolden, Al Smith, Ernest Wilson, Frank Austin, Joe Rickson and Wynn Mace are splendidly done.

It was the intention of the Trustees to put on a campaign in September of last year in order to raise sufficient money to go ahead with the erection of a new hospital but at about the time we were completing arrangements for the campaign, signs were then apparent that the potato industry last year would be in very bad shape and, as you all know, this turned out to be the case, and the Trustees thought it wise not to go ahead with the campaign. At the regular meeting of the Trustees held this month it was decided to defer our campaign until 1930 because it was felt that this year is not to be a favorable one in which to ask our people for a large amount of money. In 1930, however, we must go ahead with this campaign no matter what the conditions may be. For the last three years our Hospital has been continually filled to the last bed and we are continually turning patients away. Hospital work is steadily on the increase and there is no doubt that our action last year of deciding on the building of a new Hospital was a wise one and the work must be commenced just as soon as possible. The Trustees felt, however, that we could carry on this year and it was much better to do this rather than put on a campaign in the face of such unfavorable conditions. Your Trustees wish to again express their most hearty appreciation of the work of the Ladies' Aid. Any person who visits the Hospital cannot fail to observe the excellent equipment of the rooms in the way of linens, etc., and this is almost wholly provided by the Ladies' Aid. To Mrs. Bentley, her officers, and associates the Trustees wish to express their great and sincere appreciation of the work done by them. They are real workers and give liberally of their time and means to keep the Hospital equipment in good shape. Nothing we could say in the way of appreciation of the excellent work of Miss Mair would fully cover the case. The public are very fortunate indeed to be able to retain the services of such a capable head for this institution. She has great ability and does not hesitate to give freely of such ability for the benefit of the Hospital. In Miss Howatt, our Head Nurse, Miss Mair has a very able assistant, as is well known to those who have had to use the Hospital during the past few years. Miss Harris, now relieved of the duties of Housekeeper, has more time to look after the finances of the Hospital and her work along this line is very satisfactory to the Trustees. The services of Mr. Garrick, the Engineer, have been very satisfactory during the year. He takes a great interest in the welfare of the Hospital and is willing at all times to assist the Superintendent and Staff in any way possible. 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The old arrangement with Dr. Houston regarding Anaesthetic fees, X-Ray and Laboratory work was cancelled during the year and Dr. Houston engaged as a salaried official of the Hospital. We have also secured the services of Dr. M. Irving to take charge of the Laboratory and Pathological work and the new arrangement is working out very satisfactorily. We have also engaged Mrs. MacNutt as Housekeeper as we found that with the increasing work in the Hospital Miss Harris could no longer take care of the joint work of Housekeeper and Secretary-Treasurer. Mrs. MacNutt's work has so far been of such a satisfactory nature that the Trustees feel safe in saying that this new arrangement will work out very largely to the benefit of the Hospital. We have great pleasure in reporting that the City Council of the City of Charlottetown have seen fit to give us a yearly grant of \$1000 and your Trustees wish to express their hearty appreciation of this movement by the City Council. While it is perhaps not quite as large as it should be in proportion to the amount of free work the Hospital is called on to do for the City, still it is a beginning and the Trustees feel that the Council did the best they could at the present time but hope that later on they may see fit to increase this to an amount in keeping with the

harmony. We also wish to express our appreciation of the constant work done by the Clergymen of the different denominations in visiting patients in the Hospital. Their work is carried on systematically and is much appreciated. According to the by-laws the terms of Mr. S. A. McLeod and Mr. Murdoch McLeod as Trustees expire this year, both being eligible for re-election. All of which is respectfully submitted. W. K. ROGERS.
