PICTOU LADY IN AEROPLANE

Providence, R. I., papers give the following prominence to the aeronautic experiences of Miss Jane Robley, who made a long flight with Jack McGee, an aviator of note: "Jack McGee made three flights in his hydroaeroplane at Crescent park yesterday, taking Miss Jane Robley of Pawtuxet as a passenger on the third trip. On his second ascension he was accompanied by Arthur Loof. "McGee arrived at his hangar at the park after 5 o'clock, and immediately went up alone and tuned the engine. He entertained the crowds which watched his flight by playing leapfrog over the spectators in the bay, and with his thrilling dips, which concluded with a run along the water on his pontoons. He also gave his passengers the benefit of this exhilarating sport."

two and one-half miles, and returned. The mean height was about 200 feet. McGee's flight was watched by people all along the upper part of the river on both shores. Hundreds of glasses were levelled on his aeroplane as it swept into view from the grounds at Crescent park, and his course was closely followed until he descended. At the Pawtuxet side he dropped and circled over Miss Robley's home. By her flight with McGee, Miss Robley achieved the distinction of being the first lady to ascend from Providence. She is enthusiastically interested in aeroplaning and planned for a second flight with McGee; but some days following his machine was wrecked and he and a passenger fell fifty feet into the Pawtuxet river. They were rescued without injury. This, however, has not dampened the young lady's ardor and she anticipates still further inroads into the air.

MAN WHO HEARD SERMONS OVER 'PHONE IS DEAD

HOLLAND, MICH., Sept. 19.—Eyer Van Zwaluwenburg, 81 years old, a pioneer, is dead from heart trouble after an illness of five years. He was the only Hollander in this city who had written a complete account of attending public worship. He never missed a sermon preached by his pastor, this being made possible through the installation of a telephone equipment between his home and the church.

ST. JOHN MAN DROWNED AT LOWER COVE

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 20.—Charles McCarthy was drowned at Lower Cove yesterday afternoon in spite of an heroic attempt to save his life made by Martin Burns. McCarthy who was a night watchman at the Sugar Refinery was on the end of the wharf occupied by Thomas Wieted and company at the Lower Cove, when he slipped and fell into the dock on the south side. As he struggled in the water his cries for help attracted the attention of a number of men engaged in unloading sand from a scow in the slip, among whom was Martin Burns. Some of the men started in search of a boat. Martin Burns ran down to the end of the wharf. When he reached there McCarthy had gone under, but a few bubbles indicated the place where he had gone down and Burns leaping into the water, a distance of twenty-five feet, dove under and managed to get hold of the drowning man and drag him back to the surface. Hardly five minutes had elapsed since the man had fallen in, but by the time Burns got hold of him, he was apparently dead.

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 19.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Synod of Rupert's Land, it was decided to increase the salaries of married priests \$1,000 a year.

FOUR MILLIONS IN SILK ON ONE TRAIN

The "Silk Train," running from Vancouver east in connection with the C. P. R. "Empress of Asia," on Tuesday the ninth brought seventeen carloads, valued at no less than \$3,000,000, consigned from China to New York, and another \$1,000,000 of other goods consigned to points in Canada. This "silk train" is the fastest freight train in North America, and is used by American importers in preference to the United States routes owing to the faster time and connections made by the Canadian Pacific route. Although silk is the main freight, this particular train carried nearly 4,000 bales of linen and cotton goods requiring urgent delivery, and also carried such things as furs from Alaska, Panama hats, and other goods subject to the caprice of fashion. It is now possible to ship silks from Yokohama to New York and Montreal in fourteen and a half days, which is six days faster than any all-American service.
