GREAT STRIKE OF HERRING.—One of the greatest strikes of herring known to fishermen along the Northumberland Strait has appeared. Nets in Bucotche N. B., Harbor and other harbors along that coast were sunk by the weight of the fish. More than one hundred men from Grand Manan are at Northumberland Strait points smoking herring.

GROWING GARDEN SEEDS.—Circular No. 17 of the Dominion Experimental Farms shows that seed of most varieties of vegetables can be grown at home as good or better quality than is the imported seed. To insure having good seed however, it should be produced from the best plants of the crop rather than those which happen to be left unused. This publication which is entitled "Every Gardener His Own Seed Grower" is obtainable from the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa and tells how to grow, select, and care for seeds of such garden crops as beans, corn, cucumbers, egg plants, lettuce, melons, parsley, peppers, peas, radish, tomatoes, and some other crops.

ANNUAL REPORT.—The annual report of the Ladies' Aid of the Methodist Church was held on Wednesday, May 21st in the Hertz Memorial Hall. The treasurer reported a balance of cash on hand \$204.25. Mrs. E. H. Beer in the report of the Red Cross work stated that since May 1918, 1,242 pairs of socks had been knit and 235 pairs of mittens, making a total since the society was organized in 1916 of 3,167 pairs of socks and 256 pairs of mittens. CAPT. CLARK'S SUCCESS.

The following reference from a Western exchange will be of much interest here as Capt. Fred Clark is the son of Mr. A. E. Clark, Station Agent at Souris. Captain Fred Clark, whose promotion to a captaincy recently made him assistant superintendent to the Trans-Siberian railroad, writes to his wife, who was formerly Miss Ann Carpenter, under date of April 2, that he has been assigned to charge of the division between Manchuria and Omsk. Captain Clark has been in the service over a year and a half and ten months of this time he has spent in Siberia. He was with the Southern Pacific company here and enlisted with the division of 300 American railroad men for a period of five years, but it is now uncertain whether he will have to remain in the service for this length of time. If he should and be stationed at Vladivostok, Mrs. Clark plans to join him. Captain Clark, who studied the Russian language before leaving this country, has been continuing his study in Siberia, and it is necessary in this branch of the service.
